

**Manhattan Community Board Six
Full Board Meeting Minutes
Wednesday, March 8, 2017 – 7:00 PM
NYU Langone Medical Center
550 First Avenue, Alumni Hall A**

Board Chair Rick Eggers called the meeting to order at 7:06 pm. He introduced First Vice-Chair Claude L. Winfield, Secretary Kathy Thompson, and District Manager for CB6, Jesús Pérez.

The agenda was amended so that the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affair Committee presented before the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee. Chair Eggers also announced that there will be a ten minute caucus for both the Land Use and Waterfront Committee and the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee, which will be held at the beginning of committee reports. The agenda was adopted as amended.

The first roll call was conducted by Assistant Secretary Aaron Humphrey.

Chair Eggers announced Public Session, and reminded all speakers to keep to a time limit of three minutes.

Public Session - Elected Representatives and Agency Reports

Michael Stinson from Comptroller Scott Stringer's office introduced himself as the new Manhattan Borough Director. He will be working with Community Boards Five, Six and Seven. Mr. Stinson announced that Comptroller Stringer will be hosting an Irish Breakfast on Friday, March 24th, and a Women's History Month Event on Tuesday, March 21st. Rebecca Kriegman from State Senator Brad Hoylman's office reported that Mr. Hoylman introduced a bill on February 14th called The New York State Liberty Act, which would make New York the first sanctuary state in the nation and protect immigrants from being victimized by unjust procedures and racial profiling. He is also introducing legislation to protect transgender students in school bathrooms. Madeline Grunewald from State Senator Liz Krueger's office spoke on budget work in Albany, highlighting areas in the budget that she has concerns with. She reported that the MTA has amended their plan for the Park Avenue ventilation project, removing funding for the project in the current budget. They will revisit the project in the future. Ms. Grunewald announced that the third session of Ms. Krueger's Roundtable for Boomers and Seniors will be held tomorrow, Thursday, morning at Lenox Hill Neighborhood House. Brice Peyre from New York State Assembly Member Dick Gottfried's office announced that the second of his community workshops on the closing of the L train will be held tomorrow, Thursday, at the Town and Village Synagogue. This month Mr. Gottfried is co-hosting two Medicare Information Events on March 23rd and 24th. Finally, Mr. Peyre reported that AM Gottfried is sponsoring The New York Health Act, which is a state single-payer health bill that would establish universal, complete health coverage for every New Yorker. Genevieve Marcy from New York State Assembly Member Dan Quart's office spoke on the current budget cuts and the efforts to secure state funding for the MTA to complete the Second Avenue Subway. Ms. Marcy reported that Mr. Quart had co-signed a letter with many of his colleagues denouncing the current outbreak of anti-Semitic acts around the state. She also reminded everyone to contact their office if constituents have any problems accessing online tax services or housing issues. Howie Levine from Council Member Dan Garodnick's office relayed Mr. Garodnick's thanks to the Community Board for all the work the board has done in relation to the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal. He noted that Mr. Garodnick is looking forward to reviewing the board's resolution on the proposal. Last week he introduced a bill called the Public Oversight of Surveillance Technology (POST) Act, which would require the NYPD to post a use policy for current and future snooping equipment it uses. He is also skeptical of the Mayor's pledge to create 100,000 private-sector jobs paying at least \$50,000 over ten years. Jorge Jimenez from Council Member Rosie Mendez's office reported that she recently attended the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee meeting to discuss the reallocation of funds for Bellevue Park South. There will be a community construction forum on March 13th on the Friends Seminary Project. The PC Richards site on East 14th Street will become The Union Square Tech Hub, a city-backed all-in-one tech center. Larson Binzer from Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney's office announced that today is International Women's Day. She reported that Ms. Maloney led a New York delegation requesting full reimbursement of the \$25M cost of protection of President Trump between his election and inauguration while he remained in New York. Ms. Maloney is also against the newly proposed Republican healthcare plan in Washington. She has issued a statement against the recent travel bans and has recently met with the NYPD on the wave of anti-Semitic crimes in the City. Jill Schoenfeld from State Assembly Member Brian Kavanagh's office announced that Katie Fringer, Interim Chief of Staff, is departing. She introduced Rebecca Miller, as the new Chief of Staff. She reported that a Medicare Information Session will be held on March 16th at the Grand Street Settlement. On Monday Mr. Kavanagh heard over seven hours of testimony on the Zero Emissions Credit Program established by the Public Service Commission. Public Session - Members of the Public

Rosalie Cutting spoke on behalf of Brooklyn-based Black Veterans for Social Justice. The organization was established in 1979 by veterans to assist other veterans to re-assimilate into society as well as provide support and assistance. John Schultz of the New York Progressive Action Network spoke on the large quantity of eligible yet unregistered voters in New York State and his organization's outreach efforts to tackle this problem.

Barbara Edmonds from the Church of the Covenant at 310 East 42nd Street invited everyone to participate in programs being held on March 18th and 19th at the church in honor of Women's History Month.

Joann Vanek from Save Murray Hill Coalition noted that her organization is relieved that the MTA has postponed the Park Avenue Ventilation Project, but is concerned it will come up again in the future and asks for CB6's support should that occur.

Lois Cremmins, the Executive Director from The Greenacre Foundation, asked that CB6 include the Green Acre Park shadow concerns in the resolution on East Midtown Rezoning. Ms. Cremmins quoted the Municipal Arts Society shadow impact studies and how they will affect Greenacre Park.

Richard Bass of the American Jewish Committee at 165 East 56th Street requested that their building, which is on the northwest corner of 56th Street and Lexington Avenue, be included in the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal.

Business Session

The February minutes were adopted.

Chair's Report

Chair Eggers reported that the MTA proposal to construct a ventilation system for the Lexington Avenue subway in the area of Murray Hill has been deferred. There was considerable concern from neighbors in the Murray Hill area; and through their efforts and the efforts of elected officials, the project has been put off. He emphasized that this project is not permanently shelved. However, when it again is under active consideration everyone will be better prepared to address community concerns for a sensible balancing of safety for the subway system against the disruption caused by the construction project.

There will be a community meeting to discuss the L Train shut down Thursday March 9th, from 7-9pm at Town and Village Synagogue, 334 East 14th Street. Members of DOT and MTA will be present to answer questions. This is a rescheduled meeting for the one cancelled due to bad weather.

Mr. Eggers is pleased to report that the application for new members of CB6 has hit an all-time high this year. The Borough President's office is hard at work sorting through this extraordinarily talented pool and we look forward to welcoming new members next month.

Chair Eggers also reported that unfortunately, the board will be losing some current members who decided not to renew their membership. Previously announced was the resignation of Robin Broschi, who will be spending more time as President of the CEC for school district 2; and Burt Rubin who has decided to focus on his direct activity with planting and protecting trees in our neighborhood and on his inventions which assist mobility-challenged individuals cope with barriers in everyday tasks. Carole Diarra, who has not been able to attend Board meetings for several months, has resigned to meet the demands of a high-level job as well as her growing family. Also, Carole and her family will soon be moving to New Jersey; and therefore is unable to maintain her membership in CB6.

We also regret to see two longer term members choose to step off the Board. After ten years of service on our Board and ten previous years on CB2, Will Weder will be leaving the Board. Will, a former chair of the Health, Seniors and Disabilities Committee, will be sorely missed; but we

know we can count on his continued community service when he is not out seeing the world on one of his international trips. Nick Smolney, Chair of the Public Safety and Environment Committee will also be stepping off the Board. Nick has been chair for about three years and finding a replacement for him will be difficult. We wish him well and we're sure we will also be seeing him planting flowers and tending tree beds in the community.

Mr. Eggers announced that along with a vacancy as chair of the Public Safety and Environment Committee resulting from Nick's resignation we have a vacancy in the position of chair of the Housing, Homeless and Human Rights Committee. Raj Nayar has served the maximum 5 years. Chair Eggers hopes to announce new chairs next month or soon thereafter. In the meantime, he has asked Fred Arcaro, currently Vice Chair of the Public Safety and Environment Committee to be acting chair; and he has also asked Raj to continue to help with coordinating the agenda of the Housing Homeless and Human Rights Committee until a new chair is named.

Mr. Eggers gave a special thanks to the members of the Land Use and Waterfront Committee for the many hours they have spent analyzing and debating the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal. While each committee finds a time when additional effort is required, this ULURP process has required many extra hours sorting through the language, discussing the issues, obtaining and weighing community input, and preparing the resolution we will vote on today. So kudos to the Land Use and Waterfront Committee for all their hard work.

Mr. Eggers also thanked Vice-Chair Claude L. Winfield for filling in for him during the past few weeks.

Finally, today is International Women's Day. The United Nations is taking the theme this year of "Women in the Changing World of Work: Planet 50-50 by 2030". Some are promoting the day with the theme as #Be Bold For Change. Let us recognize all the bold women – especially the female members of CB6, and women throughout our district. Thank you for your contributions to the welfare of our community.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Jesús Perez reported that for 5 months now, the CB6 district office has been in a temporary office space. As Mr. Perez previously reported, the CB6 office will be moving to the old Police Academy building on 20th Street while DCAS continues to search for office space for us. If you'll recall, after a protracted negotiation, the landlord of the building where DCAS was hoping to find us proper office space opted to no longer rent space to the city. DCAS is currently exploring spaces in other buildings in the vicinity of Grand Central, but it's too soon to tell if any of them will pan out. In any case, the office will be moving on Monday, March 20th. Mr. Perez has been touring our new temporary office with DCAS and DoITT, and those two agencies are in the process of making the necessary repairs and renovations to the space, so that it can be ready for our arrival. In anticipation of our move, DoITT will have to take our phone and internet offline starting on the Friday before our move, March 17. Since we will not have phone or internet, our office will effectively be closed on Friday, March 17th – Monday, March 20th. We hope to reopen, and have fully operational phone and internet, on Tuesday, March 21st at our new Police Academy location, but be patient with us around that time.

As the board voted on last month, George Janes, our urban planning consultant, has now started consulting with us. His first project was acting as a resource as the Land Use and Waterfront Committee crafted its resolution on the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal. From the feedback Mr. Perez received, the committee was very grateful to have his expertise on hand. Part of the money to pay for our consultant's services comes to us from Council Member Ben Kallos, who granted us money in our budget this fiscal year specifically for the purpose of engaging the services of an urban planning consultant for the Board. We are very thankful for

the money and hope that he will be just as generous in the upcoming fiscal year. And we hope his colleagues in the council who represent parts of our district will also grant us similar allowances in our budget in the upcoming fiscal year.

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Treasurer's Report

Assistant Treasurer Brian Van Nieuwenhoven reported on behalf of Treasurer Beatrice Disman that the OMB Report from Feb 28, 2017 shows that of the Personal Services Budget of \$204,628, a balance of \$116,917 remains, with \$87,711 spent or obligated. The current budget for Other Than Personal Services excluding rent is \$119,911. The balance is \$108,459, which includes Street Fair Funds of \$88,128. Without Street Fair Funds the balance is \$31,783, with \$10,342 spent or obligated and \$20,331 remaining. Note that some of these figures have atypically changed since last month, in alignment with the establishment of budget items for the urban planning consultant. Finally, our rent budget is \$126,009.00 with the balance being \$32,271 and \$93,738 spent or obligated.

Chair Eggers called a recess at 8:12 pm in order for the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee and the Land Use and Waterfront Committee to caucus on resolutions. The meeting reconvened at 8:34 pm.

Borough President's Report

Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer thanked Community Board Six for participating in the Community Board application process. She also thanked Chair Rick Eggers for his work with her office. Ms. Brewer noted that she's excited about Women's History month; and she announced that on March 20th her office will hold an exhibition of memorabilia collected from the lives of women in politics. She also announced that on March 13th at John Jay College a bystander training session will be held to prevent sexual harassment in the city. Ms. Brewer is especially concerned that so many of our neighborhood supermarkets are disappearing because of the Commercial Rent Tax. She is working with other elected officials on a bill to reform this tax. She also announced that after thirteen years City Council has finally passed a bill that requires buildings to display their address. This is extremely helpful to emergency responders in getting to locations faster. On Thursday, March 16th, at 8:30 am, the Manhattan Borough Board will meet to vote on the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal. Last Thursday, March 2nd, Ms. Brewer held a public hearing at Guttman Community College on the Greater East Midtown Rezoning Proposal with 100 people in attendance and twenty speakers. Some concerns that were raised at the hearing that she also shares include the exclusions of portions of Third Avenue, privately owned public spaces, floor price for transfer of development rights into public realm, and residential conversions of commercial options. It was clear from the hearing that there are competing concerns. In addition, she is concerned about the loss of light and air, especially as it applies to Green Acre Park. 1. Budget and Governmental Affairs

Committee Member Martin Barrett reported on behalf of Chair Pédro Carrillo that CB6 was the only community board that submitted its response to budget requests on time on Feb 23rd. At last month's meeting NYC Votes gave a presentation on their outreach efforts and the steps they take to register voters. Their resources will be on the CB6 website. On March 13th a representative from the Comptroller's Office will be coming to discuss budget challenges. Please let the committee know of any audits other committees would like to request of the Comptroller's Office.

2. Transportation

Committee Chair Sandra McKee reported on a discussion at the most recent committee meeting on dangerous intersections. The list of those intersections is on the CB6 website. The DOT has reported Second Avenue improvements.

3. Health and Education

Chair Ahsia Badi reported that at the last committee meeting Brad Korn from Mount Sinai Beth Israel discussed a proposed primary care center between Peter Cooper Village and Stuyvesant Town. The committee’s Senior Survey is almost finished and will be sent out from the board office to residential buildings and community groups. A second survey will follow the first, with different questions.

Vice-Chair Claude L. Winfield reported that the Gilman Hall site sold to CIN developer, as reported by The Real Deal.

4. Housing, Homeless and Human Rights

Chair Raj Nayar reported that the next committee meeting will be Tuesday, March 14th. On the agenda will be a discussion of how the travel ban affects New Yorkers in our district. The committee will also be discussing a homeless subsidy program and the affordable housing project the committee has been working on.

5. Business Affairs and Street Activities

Chair Keith Powers presented, along with Kyle Athayde, who had chaired part of last month’s committee meeting. Resolution 5m is held over. Resolution 5j was discussed individually, with Kyle handling the discussion. Resolutions 5a, b, c, d, e, g, h, l, j, k, and l were bundled and passed. Chair Powers waived a report.

Land Use & Waterfront

DCP applications N170186 ZRM and 170187 ZMM - Proposal for Greater East Midtown Rezoning

Whereas, the New York City Department of City Planning (DCP) has completed a DEIS as part of the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure certification (Applications N 170187 ZMM & C 170186 ZRM) for Greater East Midtown; and

Whereas, Manhattan Community Board Six has participated in the process as a member of the East Midtown Steering Committee, by holding public hearings and engaging an urban planner, among other avenues; and

Whereas, the East Midtown Steering Committee recommended several public benefits for East Midtown to counterbalance the effects of new, denser development:

- Improvement of the public realm including the better use of streets and the provision of more and better on-site open space,
- Improvement of subway stations serving East Midtown, including ADA compliance,
- Designation of additional landmarks and the more liberal transfer of air rights from landmarks; and

Whereas, there remain many unresolved issues in a number of major categories (open space, MTA improvements, internal and external boundaries, above ground public realm enhancements, and impacts of air and light reductions), which this resolution seeks to highlight and present those solutions preferred by the community; and

Whereas, instead of treating on-site public open space, subway station improvements, and transfers of air rights equally the City's proposed zoning text places on-site public open space as the lowest priority in three key ways:

- Requiring that a development site use subway station bonus floor area and transferred air rights before applying for a special permit for on-site public open space, and
- Requiring a special permit for public concourses; while subway station improvements and air rights transfers can be as-of-right by certification; and
- Removing the as-of-right plaza bonus on qualifying sites; and

Whereas, as a result of these constraints, the Draft EIS for East Midtown predicts that only two of the 16 projected development sites will apply for a special permit for a "public concourse"; and

Whereas, the Draft EIS for East Midtown finds "the Proposed Action would result in a significant adverse impact on open space due to reduced total and passive open space ratios", and given the great and increasing need for public open space in East Midtown and the extreme challenges of developing new open space; and

Whereas, the creation of pedestrian circulation maps illustrating the specifics of above-ground open space improvements—such as plazas, other privately-owned public spaces (POPS) and shared streets or other thoroughfare improvements—would provide predictability for developers, the MTA, the city and the public and, critically, a better ability to value such improvements; and

Whereas, the proposed zoning mechanism to determine and prioritize transit and public realm improvements is based on a "Priority Improvement List for Qualifying Sites," which would be managed and updated by a nine-member governing group, including representation from the Community Board; and

Whereas, the MTA has already identified 24 improvements at six subway stations serving East Midtown, none of which are included in the current MTA capital plan, and these improvements provide benefits outside the East Midtown Subdistrict, and in fact promote as well as theoretically alleviate overcrowding; and

Whereas, these transit improvements rely upon public funding for maintenance, repair and replacement; and

Whereas, East Midtown was up-zoned in the 1961 Zoning Resolution in major part predicated on the Second Avenue Subway replacing the demolished Second and Third Avenue El's; and

Whereas, the MTA & NYC DOT developed a concept plan for public realm improvements ranging from public plazas to bus bulb-outs; and

Whereas, above-ground public realm improvements may never materialize without a clearly defined mechanism or minimum contribution rate to ensure that public realm improvements are created; and

Whereas, East Midtown Steering Committee recommendations, decades of DCP and CPC zoning policy direction, and accepted urban planning design principles all concur that midblocks that front narrow streets should have lower FAR and street walls, thus protecting the scale and character of the area, as well as light and air; and

Whereas, the proposed zoning text for "qualifying sites" in East Midtown allows greater amounts of FAR to be transferred from landmark buildings to sites in the lower density midblock districts than to the higher density wide street and avenue districts, and removes the incentive for lower street walls on narrow streets; and

Whereas, the DEIS for East Midtown does not specifically address the impacts of such higher FARs and street walls on midblock sites, and

Whereas, the proposed East Midtown Subdistrict is drawn to include the east side of Third Avenue north of 47th Street, and would allow commercial buildings of up to 26 FAR to directly abut on an FAR R8B district; and

Whereas, it appears that the Department of City Planning is rezoning specific areas based on buildings already identified for redevelopment and not giving due consideration to residents' reasonable concerns about access to air and light and the quality-of-life problems concomitant with large construction projects; and

Whereas, the DEIS for East Midtown shows that 116 of 119 intersections studied will experience significant adverse impacts, demonstrating the unprecedented levels of traffic and congestion the rezoning will bring, even to areas outside the proposed East Midtown Subdistrict; and

Whereas, neighborhood residents' concerns that including the east side of Third Avenue in the East Midtown Subdistrict will turn the Turtle Bay neighborhood into a commercial district have not been given the same consideration as commercial real estate interests; and

Whereas, currently existing public spaces and parks must be protected from shadows and adverse conditions that new buildings and structures may pose; and

Whereas, the East Midtown Steering Committee recommended the existing height and setback regulations for the Special Midtown District be retained in East Midtown to protect light and air from being blocked by the larger new buildings that the zoning would encourage, and

Whereas, the City's proposed zoning text would substantially change the existing height and setback rules for "qualifying sites" in East Midtown by:

- Decreasing the passing score for Daylight Evaluation from 75 to 66,
- Not counting daylight blockage below 150 feet above street level, even on narrow streets in Daylight Evaluation,
- Eliminating the penalty for blockage on the street side of the profile line in Daylight Evaluation, and

Whereas, One Vanderbilt scored negative 62.10 under the existing Daylight Evaluation rules and would score positive 20.45 under the proposed changes – a large difference, and

Whereas, the Draft EIS for East Midtown neither discloses nor discusses the proposed changes to the scoring system for Daylight Evaluation, and

Whereas, diminishing light and air in streets and other public spaces, narrowing views along streets, and reducing the space between buildings, constraining their light, air, and views is inconsistent with the stated goal of maintaining East Midtown as a premier business address; and

Whereas, the DEIS does not adequately address sustainability concerns; and

Whereas, the existing Midtown Special District has provisions to preserve daylight reaching the street, benefiting the community's few open spaces available for the public's health and enjoyment, in spaces such as Greenacre Park and other parks that would be undermined by shadow, but those provisions are weakened by the proposed East Midtown Subdistrict;

Therefore be it

Resolved, because of the desperate need for public open space in East Midtown that is not cast in excessive shadow through most of the year, Manhattan Community Board Six, objects to the proposed Greater East Midtown Rezoning unless the following stipulations are addressed; and be it further

Resolved, that DCP provide design guidance making plazas, covered pedestrian spaces, and other POPS as-of-right by certification and require that the first additional FAR earned by any site be for on-site public open space, including on-site transit access improvements; and be it further

Resolved, that DCP should require the publication of pedestrian circulation maps which illustrate the specific and demonstrable public value of open space that would provide FAR benefits to the developer; and be it further

Resolved, that in planning transit improvements, a high priority should be given to both focusing on improvements that will benefit the Greater East Midtown Subdistrict while consideration of the multimodal use of both above and below ground transit and public space and relieving the existing overcrowding and connections with the #7 subway line and the future Second Avenue Subway; and be it further

Resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six strongly recommends that the proposed zoning text for East Midtown be modified to protect the midblocks of narrow streets by limiting the floor area that may be added to the midblock districts, and maintaining the incentives of the current height and setback rules for lower street walls on narrow streets; and be it further

Resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six maintains that the boundary of the East Midtown Subdistrict be moved to the center of Third Avenue from 43rd Street to 56th Street; and be it further

Resolved, the increase of the FAR on the Pfizer site from C5-2 (10 FAR) to C5-3 (15 FAR) should require the owner to contribute to public realm improvements just as any other owner of an overbuilt building would be required to do; and be it further

Resolved, that the maintenance, repair, and replacement (MR&R) of public transit improvements be associated with FAR such that the occupancy of the bonused space be contingent on a Certificate of Occupancy, enforced by a tax lien, or ensured by such other enforcement mechanism that requires the recipient of the FAR to pay for the MR&R of the associated transit improvement; and be it further

Resolved, that CB6 endorses high-performance building and sustainability goals as outlined in the East Midtown Steering Committee report; and be it further

Resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six, because light and air are essential to the continued attractiveness of East Midtown, strongly recommends that the proposed zoning text for the East Midtown Subdistrict be modified to retain the existing height and setback regulations of the Special Midtown District; and be it further

Resolved, the words "objects to" and "unless" in the first resolved clause shall be interpreted as "approves" and "conditional upon" respectively if, on or before March 13th, 2017, the New York City Mayor's Office or the New York City Department of City Planning communicates the following to Manhattan Community Boards Five and Six in writing: The EIS will consider an alternative that requires redeveloped sites to include either outdoor plaza space or a covered pedestrian space.

Parks, Landmarks & Cultural Affairs

b. LPC Certificate of Appropriateness app-fast track work order for Citicorp Building, 601 Lexington Ave on E. 53rd St. Application is to modify the base and entrances at the market building (Interior Work)

Whereas Boston Properties has applied for a certificate of appropriateness for façade and entry changes at the ground floor to provide access to public spaces at 601 Lexington Ave. a.k.a. Citicorp center and to upgrade the existing separate entry to a secondary commercial space

Whereas public spaces for which zoning bonuses were received are a primary factor in the building's landmark designation

Whereas the proposed changes will provide greatly enhanced openness from the sidewalk to the public spaces

Whereas the proposed architectural vocabulary of the changes is harmonious with the vocabulary of the existing facade, storefronts, and entries

Therefore be it resolved that community board six finds the proposed changes to be appropriate to 601 Lexington Avenue aka Citicorp Center as an individual New York City landmark

VOTE: 42 in Favor 0 Opposed 1 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

Public Safety & Environment

a. Link terms of service and privacy policy improvements

WHEREAS, The city of New York through its Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications entered in to a franchise agreement with CityBridge, LLC, to install, operate and maintain public communications structures in 2014, for a period of 12 years; and

WHEREAS, As part of their installation, CityBridge chose structures known as Links to provide such services as governed by the agreement, among which include free 911 and 311 calls, and free wireless high speed internet; and

WHEREAS, Both CityBridge and the city of New York have a vested interest in making sure these structures remain in good working order and continue to generate advertising revenue, and are deemed beneficial to the community; and

WHEREAS, While the full rollout of all 7500 Link units will take five years, there is now a critical mass of Links throughout the city allowing residents to evaluate the terms of service and privacy policy around the usage of this service; and

WHEREAS, CityBridge has made amendments to the Link units through the use of software updates to address concerns brought about through the media, including limiting the use of the built in screen to a subset of its original capability; and

WHEREAS, The Public Safety and Environmental committee of Manhattan Community Board 6 has reviewed both the terms of service and privacy policy for using the free Wi-Fi connection for mobile devices; and

WHEREAS, There is a universal technology and policy known as Do Not Track that allows users to opt-out of tracking by websites they visit, including analytics services, advertising networks, and social platforms. Do Not Track is analogous to the do not call list for telemarketers, but in this case would also cover the tracking of the physical location of the user; and

WHEREAS, According to the privacy policy, the free WI-FI provided by the Links does not conform to Do Not Track; and

WHEREAS, the terms of service and privacy policy indicate that the franchisee shall provide an option for users to employ encryption during its use of the wireless network, but then they also indicate the security of the users data transmitted through their services is at the user's own risk. This is not readily apparent when signing up for the service; and

THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, That Manhattan Community Board 6 urges all New York City elected officials and the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications to push for, and CityBridge to make the following changes:

- Links should be compliant with the Do Not Track standard, and updates to their software and privacy policy should be made accordingly
- Make it more obvious that the onus is on the part of the user to secure data exchanges with the Link units, by requiring new users to specifically acknowledge that this is the case, separately from the rest of the privacy policy and terms of service; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Manhattan Community Board 6 urges all New York State and New York City elected officials to pass legislation requiring the use of either opt-in or opt-out standards, like Do Not Track, for all internet based advertising occurring on devices within their jurisdiction, allowing the user to set what information they wish to share. This should cover hardware devices, browsers, websites, and any other technology the user may come in contact with during normal web browsing and should ensure their privacy, and prevent the tracking of information about that user.

VOTE: 43 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

b. Intro 1300-2016 publicly available noise mitigation plans

WHEREAS, The City of New York through its Department of Buildings mandates that construction sites prepare and follow a noise mitigation plan; and

WHEREAS, The details of such plans must be submitted to the department and upon request at the construction site can be viewed by persons authorized to enforce the provisions of the building code; and

WHEREAS, noise from construction sites continues to be an impediment to the citizens of Manhattan Community Board 6, which has a number of active sites ongoing simultaneously, and for whom it is burdensome to view and understand what is being done to mitigate this nuisance; and

WHEREAS, Council Member Dan Garodnick has proposed Intro 1300-2016 which would amend the administrative code of the City of New York to:

- Provide for the noise mitigation plans to be displayed in a conspicuously visible manner on the exterior of the construction site and made accessible for inspection by the public
- Further require the noise mitigation plans to be made available online to the public on the website of the Department of Buildings in an easy-to-find manner.

THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that Community Board 6 urges the New York City Council to pass and the Mayor to sign Intro 1300 of 2016; and therefore be it further

RESOLVED, the noise mitigation plans should be sent directly to the board office of the affected community district.

VOTE: 43 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

c. Intro 1408-2016 reporting disaggregated data on sexual harassment and sex offenses

WHEREAS, the number of for-hire vehicles has greatly increased in recent years, with a disproportionate amount in midtown including Manhattan CD6; and

WHEREAS, Based upon news investigations and user complaints of for-hire vehicle services, the number of incidents involving sex related crimes are grossly under reported; and

WHEREAS, the method of operation for these for-hire vehicles are under the purview of the Taxi and Limousine Commission; and

WHEREAS, Council Member Dan Garodnick has proposed Intro 1408-2016 which would amend the administrative code of the City of New York to require the Taxi and Limousine Commission with the aid of the 311 Citizen Service Center and the Police Department to collect, report, and make publicly available the disaggregate occurrence of sexual offenses, in a manner that maintains the privacy of all parties involved.

THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that Community Board 6 urges the New York City Council to pass and the Mayor to sign Intro 1408 of 2016.

VOTE: 43 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

d. NYS A01884/S03438 banning formaldehyde in children's products.

WHEREAS, Formaldehyde has been classified as a carcinogen by the US Department of Health and Human Services; and

WHEREAS, the presence of formaldehyde even in small amounts can cause the following adverse health effects:

- sore throat
- cough
- scratchy eyes
- nosebleeds

of which children are particularly susceptible to; and

WHEREAS, the current laws allow the inclusion of formaldehyde in a wide range of products, including those intended for use by children; and

WHEREAS, New York State assembly bill A01884 and senate bill S03438 attempt to rectify this by officially defining children’s products as a product primarily designed, intended or marketed by a manufacturer to be physically applied to or introduced into a child’s body, or used by a child, such as baby products, toys, car seats, personal care products, a product designed or intended by the manufacturer to help a child with sucking or teething, to facilitate sleep, relaxation, or the feeding of a child, novelty products, bedding, furniture, furnishings, and children's apparel; and

WHEREAS, the bills go on to further mandate that beginning April first, two thousand nineteen, no retailer may sell or offer for sale in New York State a children’s product that intentionally contains:

- formaldehyde, including formaldehyde contained in a solution; or
- ingredients that chemically degrade under normal conditions of temperature and pressure to release free formaldehyde at levels exceeding 0.05 percent.

THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that Community Board 6 urges the New York State assembly and senate to pass, and the governor to sign Assembly A01884 / Senate S03438.
