

**Manhattan Community Board Six**  
**Full Board Meeting Minutes**  
**Wednesday, February 8, 2017 – 7:00 PM**  
**Hospital for Joint Diseases**  
**301 East 17<sup>th</sup> Street, Loeb Auditorium**

Board Chair Rick Eggers called the meeting to order at 7:07pm. He introduced Secretary Kathy Thompson and District Manager for CB6, Jesús Pérez.

The agenda was adopted and the first roll call was conducted by Secretary Kathy Thompson.

Chair Eggers announced Public Session and welcomed District Attorney Cyrus Vance, Jr.

**Public Session - Elected Representatives and Agency Reports**

New York County District Attorney Cyrus Vance, Jr. spoke on the overall trends in violent crime. He reported that he is encouraged by the trends as being positive, allowing for some spikes. He introduced Ileana Mendoza, as the Community Coordinator for Community Board 6. Mr. Vance spoke on his office's concerns regarding mentally ill criminal offenders and the lack of treatment for these people; the result being a continual cycle in and out of the criminal justice system. DA Vance is working with the NYPD to review options to deal with quality-of-life crimes and more serious offenses committed by the mentally ill that could result in treatment rather than incarceration. He also discussed the continued problem of domestic violence in New York City, specifically that it often goes under-reported. It is his mission as District Attorney to effectively deal with domestic violence offenders; especially those that are repeat offenders. He has pushed Albany to increase the penalties for repeat domestic violence offenders that result in felony charges. Finally, he announced that over the past several years his office has been investigating foreign financial institutions associated with rogue nations and illicit transactions that have resulted in millions of dollars in fines for the city. Larson Binzer from Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney's office reported that Congresswoman Maloney held a news conference this morning celebrating the start of the Spring 2017 New York Fashion week. She released a new fact sheet outlining the economic benefits that the Fall and Spring Fashion Weeks and the fashion industry bring to New York City. Ms. Maloney announced that "New York's fashion weeks generate almost \$900 million in economic activity for the city, millions more than our contemporaries in London, Paris, and Milan. More fashion designers are employed in NYC than anywhere else in the country, and the industry pays over \$11 billion in wages each year." NYC Fashion Week officially starts tomorrow. She has also called for a congressional investigation of the immigration ban. In addition, Ms. Maloney is a senior member of the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform; and, as such, wants to determine if the ban is constitutional. Rebecca Kriegman from State Senator Brad Hoylman's office reported on Senator Hoylman's participation in the LGBT Solidarity rally held on Saturday in front of the Stonewall Inn as a show of solidarity against the new administration's discriminatory policies, specifically targeting the Muslim community. Ms. Kriegman also announced that on Monday February 13<sup>th</sup>, Senator Holyman will release a co-sponsored bill with Senator Jose Serrano to make New York State a sanctuary state as New York City is a sanctuary city. Ms. Kriegman noted that there is an updated report on hate crime statistics on the Senator's website. On January 17<sup>th</sup> Senator Hoylman debated on the Senate floor on the plastic bag fee. The bill passed, which prevents a city of more than 1 million people from charging a bag fee. This effectively excludes New York City from the bag fee. Finally, Ms. Kriegman asked everyone to submit their nominations for 2017 NYS Women of Distinction and Veteran's Hall of Fame to the website. Marianna Vaidman- Stone from Council Member Dan Garodnick's office reported on Trump Tower security closures (Trumpdate). Mr. Garodnick is advocating to ease the impact of these security measures on small businesses in the area. On January 17<sup>th</sup> he sent a letter to NYPD Commissioner O'Neal asking that the NYPD maintain a specific security contingent for continuity purposes for the neighborhood. He has asked the MTA to restore bus stops that have been suspended at Fifth Avenue and 57<sup>th</sup> Street. Last month the city began the ULRURP process for the East Midtown Rezoning, which is before CB6 now. Last week twelve buildings were designated landmarks in anticipation of the process. In response to the immigration concerns generated by Washington's recent actions, CM Garodnick will be co-hosting a forum called 'Protecting the Vulnerable: Call to Action on Immigration and the Refugee Crisis' with Temple Emanu-El on Wednesday, February 15<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm at Temple Emanu-El. Finally, Ms. Vaidman-Stone announced that in anticipation of tomorrow's snow storm, New York City public schools will be closed tomorrow. She took questions from board members.

Jorge Jiminez from Council Member Rosie Mendez's office reported that over 1,000 people attended Ms. Mendez's 'Rally Against Hate' in Tompkins Square Park on the evening of January 30<sup>th</sup>. The rally was organized in response to the immigration ban. The Borough President and many elected officials attended, where the crowd chanted in both Spanish and English. Eric Holguin from Comptroller Scott Stringer's office reported that a report recently generated by Mr. Stringer, along with a report from the Fiscal Policy Institute indicates that providing driver's licenses to undocumented individuals would greatly benefit the individuals and their families by improving their job prospects, as well as New York City in the form of added revenue. Marisa Redanty from the Mayor's Office of Media and Entertainment announced a new initiative called One Book One New York, the largest community reading program in the country. Jill Schoenfeld from State Assembly Member Brian Kavanagh's office reported that Mr. Kavanagh had voted against the plastic bag moratorium. She also reported that AM Kavanagh had recently co-signed a letter with several other Assembly Members, State Senators, City Council Members, the Borough President and Congressmen addressed to the New York State Department of Health regarding the upcoming closing of facilities application for Mount Sinai Beth Israel. The letter addressed the collective elected officials' concerns over the process of the closure and the potential inability to protect the public interest in the interim. The town meeting with the MTA and the DOT on the L train shut-down scheduled for tomorrow evening at 7 pm at the Town and Village Synagogue at 334 East 14<sup>th</sup> Street may be postponed due to tomorrow's predicted snow storm. ### **Public Session - Members of the Public**

Adrienne Alexanian from Murray Hill spoke on the Turken Foundation dormitory building that is being constructed on 41<sup>st</sup> and Second Avenue. She noted that the building is being built by the country of Turkey and being financed by Saudi Arabia. While the dormitory will be located near the United Nations, the school will be located on the west side. Ms. Alexanian and her colleague, Scott Baker,

are concerned for the security of the area. They complained that the Turken Foundation is not forthcoming on the countries of origins of the students that will be housed in the dormitory. Mr. Baker suggested that the MTA should purchase the site in association with the eventual completion of the Second Avenue Subway.

### **Business Session**

### **Chair's Report**

Chair Eggers acknowledged the predicted snow storm and took the opportunity to urge everyone to sign up for Notify NYC to receive information about emergency conditions and City services. Today the office received the final scoping document on the Lexington Avenue subway line ventilation project in Murray Hill. The DEIS is not yet available. It is our understanding that scheduling a public hearing and the beginning of the comment period will not be until after the DEIS is issued. Mr. Eggers also noted that while there is an L Train community input meeting scheduled for tomorrow at 7pm at the Town and Village Synagogue at 334 East 14th Street, we do not have word yet about whether the meeting will be cancelled due to weather. The East Side Coastal Resiliency session is scheduled for Thursday, February 16<sup>th</sup>, at 6:30pm at the VA Medical Center Atrium at 423 East 23rd street east of First Avenue. This is a chance for the community to express their ideas for Asser Levy Playground and Murphy's Brothers playground. The Borough President's State of the Borough Address will be on Sunday, February 12th from 2 pm to 4 pm. Lesley Almanzar from the Borough President's Office will provide more details during her report. Chair Eggers thanked the Land Use and Waterfront Committee and Chair Sandro Sherrod for a well-run, well attended public hearing on East Midtown Rezoning. Mr. Sherrod will provide more details during his report. Community Board applications and re-applications are almost completed. Mr. Eggers thanked everyone who submitted their application in a timely manner. Finally, there are two new opportunities for affordable housing in the district. ### **District Manager's Report**

District Manager Jesús Perez reported that the lease negotiations between DCAS and the landlord of CB6's potential new office have broken down. As a result, the temporary office space at the old Police Academy building will be CB6's new home indefinitely.

### **Treasurer's Report**

Treasurer Beatrice Disman reported that the OMB report from February 1, 2017 shows that of the Personal Services Budget of \$211,437.00, a balance of \$134,350.00, with \$77,087.00 spent or obligated. The current budget for Other Than Personal Services excluding rent is \$113,102.00. The balance is \$101,800.00 with \$10,058.00 spent or obligated. Street Fair Funds of \$88,128.00 are included in the balance. The Other Than Personal Services balance without Street Fair Funds is \$24,974.00. The balance is \$14,916.00 with \$10,058.00 spent or obligated. The rent budget is \$126,009.00 with the balance being \$41,915.00 and \$84,094.00 spent or obligated.

### **Borough President's Report**

Lesly Almanzar from the office of Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer announced that the deadline for community board applications is extended to February 10th. The State of the Borough address will be on February 12th at The Manhattan Center at 311 West 34<sup>th</sup> Street. Doors open at 1 pm. ## **RESOLUTIONS**

### **Executive Committee**

#### **Re: Engaging an Urban Planning Consultant**

**Whereas**, for many years, Community Board Six (CB6) has advocated for funding to support a full-time planner to provide advice and support in such urban planning topics as zoning, land use, urban design, affordable housing, development RFPs, environmental reviews, and various related topics that may arise in the course of the Board's work; and

**Whereas**, CB6 has an immediate and continuing need for district specific and balanced analysis on such issues; and

**Whereas**, funding remains insufficient for a full-time position but, in part through funding earmarked for an urban planner at CB6 by Council Member Ben Kallos, there are sufficient funds in the CB6 budget to pay for a limited amount of consulting services in the broad area described as urban planning; and

**Whereas**, CB6 has reviewed arrangements made by other community boards to obtain consulting services; and

**Whereas**, among many other projects in New York City and New York State, George Janes and Associates has provided services to Manhattan Community Board 11 on the topic of Zoning for Quality and Affordability (ZQA) & Mandatory Inclusionary Housing (MIH) in addressing concerns specific to that district, and

**Whereas**, George Janes and Associates has significant experience in the use of digital technology to explain impacts and benefits of proposals and provides information leading to better informed decision-making by its community-based clients without imposing any one urban planning paradigm or philosophy, and

**Whereas**, the Executive Committee of CB6 unanimously approved engaging George Janes and Associates to provide services to CB6 with total payments not to exceed \$20,000 in any one fiscal year

#### **Therefore, be it**

**Resolved**, CB6 authorizes engaging the services of George James and Associates on an as-needed basis in an amount not to exceed \$20,000 in fiscal year 2017 and payable from any funds allocated to or held by CB6, and be it further

**Resolved**, CB6 authorizes the continuation of services into fiscal year 2018, should such services be deemed appropriate by the Executive Committee of CB6 and permitted by the City's human resources policies and with a cap on payments in fiscal year 2018 not to exceed \$20,000.

### **6. Transportation**

#### **a. In support of co-naming East 19<sup>th</sup> Street between Second and Third Avenues to include "Mother Cabrini Way"**

**Whereas**, the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart are requesting a street co-naming in Community Board Six Manhattan, to commemorate Columbus Hospital and the subsequent Hospice at 237 East 19<sup>th</sup> street in observance of the 100th anniversary of Mother Francis Xavier Cabrini's death; and

**Whereas**, the Hospital established in 1886, eventually expanded and known as Cabrini Medical Center closed in 2008, having made a significant contribution to improve the lives of the citizens of New York; and

**Whereas**, Mother Cabrini and the Sisters Of Mercy worked tirelessly to establish the hospital, healthcare, education and immigrant’s rights services for the Italian immigrants of New York City who were being discriminated against and excluded from American Society due to their language and cultural differences; and

**Whereas**, Mother Cabrini expanded services to immigrants in New Orleans in 1892 after the lynching of Italians there and increased Anti-Italian sentiment and calls to restrict immigration; and

**Whereas**, Mother Cabrini went on to fight for the rights of all persons to flee political, religious, or economic persecution; and support the basic human rights and dignity of all persons regarding: food, shelter, health care, employment at just wages, religious freedom and also honoring their customs and traditions; and

**Whereas**, her mission grew to educate herself and others and about the needs of immigrants, re-examine political laws and regulations in the light of these justice issues and to work to change those that did not meet human needs and work with other groups to promote justice and compassion for all immigrants; and

**Whereas**, Mother Cabrini despite being born in Italy and living with life-long frail health and without ever having mastered the English language, established Hospitals, Schools, Orphanages and Immigrant Services throughout the United States, and became the first woman to be given the title of “Missionary” and the first American Citizen canonized as a Saint by the Vatican; and

**Now therefore be it resolved**, that Community Board Six Manhattan supports the permanent co-naming of 19th Street between Second and Third Avenues to include “Mother Cabrini Way.

**b. Introduction Number 1243-2016 (“Int. No. 1243-2016”) –in relation to the Taxi and Limousine Commission (“TLC”) licensing of drivers with multiple license suspensions**

**WHEREAS**, the number of crashes in the City of New York involving vehicles regulated by the TLC has increased substantially over the last two years – for example, there were more than 9,000 crashes involving “black cars” (a category of for-hire vehicles regulated by the TLC) in the first seven months of 2016, nearly twice the number in the first seven months of 2015; and

**WHEREAS**, in the City of New York, being struck by a motor vehicle is now the leading cause of injury-related death for children under the age of 14, and the second-leading cause of injury-related death for seniors; and

**WHEREAS**, motor vehicle crashes are now the leading cause of injury-related death for residents of New York State; and

**WHEREAS**, the licensing criteria used by the TLC affects the safety of people who use or otherwise are exposed to taxicabs and for-hire vehicles in the City of New York; and

**WHEREAS**, crashes involving vehicles regulated by the TLC, and the recent, substantial increases in the number of such crashes, are a public safety concern that threatens the wellbeing of people in our community and the quality of life in our community; and

**WHEREAS**, the amendments to the Code proposed in Int. No. 1243-2016 would prohibit the TLC from granting a new or renewal taxicab or for-hire vehicle driver’s license to any person who has received three or more relevant suspensions of either of the following licenses within the 10-year period prior to such person’s application: (1) a driver’s license, or (2) a taxicab or for-hire vehicle driver’s license issued by the TLC; and

**WHEREAS**, Int. No. 1243-2016 focuses on suspensions that are relevant to public safety – such as suspensions due to conviction(s) for (i) homicide or assault arising out of the operation of a vehicle, (ii) criminal negligence in the operation of a vehicle resulting in death, (iii) violation of regulations

governing the right of way, where that causes serious physical injury or death, (iv) gross negligence in the operation of a vehicle showing reckless disregard for the life or property of others, (v) violation of law making it unlawful to leave the scene of an accident without reporting, (vi) multiple violations for speeding, and/or (vii) knowingly using a motor vehicle in aid or furtherance of a crime; and

**WHEREAS**, the amendments to the Code proposed in Int. No. 1243-2016 would help improve public safety by enhancing the licensing criteria used by the TLC; and

**WHEREAS**, Int. No. 1243-2016 is before the New York City Council's Committee on Transportation;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, for the reasons described herein, Manhattan Community Board 6 strongly recommends that the New York City Council adopt Int. No. 1243-2016 and cause it to be promptly implemented by the TLC.

**b. New BW License, 401 KCBS Corp. dba Bread & Butter, 401 E. 34 St. bet. First Avenue and the FDR Drive**

**WHEREAS**, the attorney Eurie Choi appeared before the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee of Community Board 6 Manhattan (CB6M) on January 26, 2016, CB6M having jurisdiction of the premises in the license application process; and

**WHEREAS**, the owner is proposing an a casual dining establishment with salads, sandwiches, and wraps, and

**WHEREAS**, the owner seeks a liquor license to allow customers to have a glass of wine or beer alongside food, and

**WHEREAS**, the establishment will be open 24 hours, 7 days a week but has agreed to limit alcohol service between the hours of 11 a.m. and 2 a.m., and

**WHEREAS**, no members of the community had any comments for or against; now

**THEREFORE**, be it

**RESOLVED**, that pursuant to the presentation made by the Representative at the meeting of the Business Affairs and Street Activities committee held on January 26, 2016 and pursuant to all other considerations, CB6M has **no objection** to the application so long as the Applicant adheres to all the Representations made by the Representative to the Committee.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, if the SLA application, **however**, contains a different method of operation than has been presented to CB6M as stated in this, **including** "Hours of Operation," that differ in **any way** from those described above, then CB6M **opposes** the application and **urges** the SLA to deny the application based on such misrepresentation to Community Board 6 Manhattan.

**c. New OP Liq. License for The Bay Seafood Cuisine East 49<sup>th</sup> LLC dba The Bay, 216 E. 49 St. bet. Second and Third Aves.**

**WHEREAS**, the owner Leidian Li appeared before the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee of Community Board 6 Manhattan (CB6M) on January 26, 2016, CB6M having jurisdiction of the premises in the license application process; and

**WHEREAS**, the committee and owner agreed to allow for later hours of operation and the owner signed stipulations to extend the closing time until midnight daily, and

**WHEREAS**, no members of the community had any comments for or against; now



**THEREFORE**, be it
