Full Board Meeting Minutes

Board Chair Rick Eggers called the meeting to order at 7:12 PM. He introduced Assistant Secretary Aaron S. Humphrey and District Manager Jesús Pérez.

The agenda was adopted.

The first roll call was conducted by Assistant Secretary Aaron S. Humphrey.

Public Session – Elected Representative and Agency Reports

Dan Campanelli from the office of the New York City Comptroller Scott M. Stringer reported on the May 17th audit of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority's Oversight of the Access-A-Ride Program. The program stranded thousands of people and operated at a deficit. Scott Stringer wants all program's cars and vans to be fitted with GPS. He also announced that the Comptroller will march in the June 26th Gay Pride Parade and wants LGBT inclusion on boards. Mr. Campanelli also informed the Board of June's LGBTQ Celebration at Macy's and of the Comptroller's NYCHA TA Breakfast on Thursday June 30th.

Shelby Garner from the office of Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney reported that the Congresswoman has called for the Department of Justice to implement measures not yet in effect that are required under the Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act (JVTA). Shelby Garner also announced that Rep. questioned the Federal Reserve Bank of New York on the recent \$81 million cyber heist from Bangladesh's central bank's account at the Fed.

Rebecca Kriegman from the office of State Senator Brad Hoylman reported on the Child Victims Act (CVA), which would extend the statute of limitations as it applies in cases of child sexual abuse. The bill failed 30-29 but the Senator will continue to pursue the matter. The Senator strongly opposed the Senate's bill that would overturn local legislation to address environmental concerns about the proliferation of plastic bags. Sen. Hoylman, along with other elected officials, is urging the State Department of Health, to work with Mount Sinai Beth Israel to keep the public well-informed with accurate, up to date details of plans regarding the hospital and medical services in our area. He is also urging The MTA and DOT to evaluate every possible option to mitigate transportation delays during any full or partial closure of the L Train.

Chris Consalvo from the office of the State Senator Liz Krueger reported that the Senator worked hard to lobby against the bill to override the NYC plastic bag legislation. Sen. Krueger also participated in the meeting to address the potential legislation on the SLA and its impact on New York City. A former staff member of the Senator is a leader in the Radical Age Movement and is sponsoring an "Intergenerational Age Café" to engage on the subject of the injustices of ageism. She also thanked the NYC Comptroller for his Access-A-Ride audit.

Brice Peyre from the office of State Assembly Member Dick Gottfried reported the Assemblyman has passed two bills: NY Health Act and the Gender Expression Act. In addition, he signed a letter along with other elected officials about Beth Israel's transformation. Mr. Peyre noted that Beth Israel does plan on opening a new facility in Manhattan's CB3 district in the future. AM Gottfried also wants to see more transparency with the SLA.

Genevieve Marcy from the office of State Assembly Member Dan Quart reported that the gravity knife legislation passed the Assembly. She also mentioned problems with election polling places and asked the public to inform AM Quart's office if they note any problems.

Howie Levine from the office of the New York City Council Member Dan Garodnick reported that the Councilmember talked to DOT and the M23 bus stop on 20th Street will be preserved in the plans for the 23rd Street Select Bus route. The Council Member also signed a letter of concern about the downsizing of Mount Sinai Beth Israel. Parts of the Midtown Tunnel are still being repaired because of damage from Super Storm Sandy. Repair work has disrupted traffic and has resulted in an increase in vehicle honking. The Council Member requested more enforcement be present to end honking.

Matt Viggiano from the office of the New York City Council Member Rosie Mendez reported Rosie voted against NYC Intro 775 which would impose a set of restrictions and deadlines on the Landmarks Preservation Commission because she wants more cushion for landmarks and historical designations, and wants any plazas opened and more friendly to pedestrians. Mr. Viggiano also announced that CM Mendez provided funding for new trash receptacles in the District, signed on to comment about New Ferry Services and questioned the changes being proposed in the SLA law. She was proud to celebrate the 100 Year History of The New York City Children's Court. CM Mendez also will be monitoring the transformation of Mount Sinai Beth Israel.

Public Session - Members of the Public

Manhattan CB8 Chair Jim Clynes extended an invitation to CB6 to rally with CB8 at Queensboro Oval, at York Ave and 59th St, Saturday, June 25th, from 11 AM to 1PM, to help make the Queensboro Oval a full-time public park and not just for three months per year. The list of co-sponsors include: Assembly Member Dan Quart, Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright, City Council Member Dan Garodnick, City Council Member Ben Kallos, New Yorkers for Parks, NYC Metro Sports, and Yorkville Sports Association. The list is still in formation.

Dr. Samuel Albert, a professor at FIT College, spoke in support of the street co-naming at 22nd St and Lexington Avenue.

Dan Harris spoke in opposition to Business Affairs and Street Activities items 8d and 8i concerning an unenclosed sidewalk café.

As a lighthearted moment, Ann Seligman, a member of CB6, displayed the afghan she had knitted while attending her committee meetings.

Business Session

The May minutes were adopted.

Chair's Report

Chair Rick Eggers announced the Nominating Committee for the 2016 election of officers: Louise Dankberg (Chair), Letty Simon, Mark Thompson, Fred Arcaro, Anne Seligman. He announced that our usual schedule would result in October's Full Board meeting being on Yom Kippur, October 12th. The meeting instead will be held on Wednesday, October 19th. The Executive Committee meeting will meet on October 26th. He also reminded members that there are no regularly scheduled meetings of Full Board in July or August, but there is always a possibility that an emergency meeting may be called. If that happens, a quorum will be essential and we will appreciate full attendance. Some but not all committees will meet during the summer months. Members were asked to be alert for emails and to check the CB6 website for possible meetings.

Mr. Eggers reported that Mount Sinai Beth Israel announced plans to downsize. There have already been meetings of elected officials and of other community leaders on what Mount Sinai Downtown will become and how it will affect medical services not only in our district but in the entire mid and downtown portions of Manhattan. At our request, tomorrow our Health and Education Committee and the CB3 equivalent committee will hold a joint-committee meeting on the plans for Mount Sinai Downtown. The meeting will focus on healthcare delivery. Our Land Use and Waterfront Committee will address the land use issues arising from the hospital downsizing at its current location. The entire process will be done over a period of four years.

Chair Eggers stated there will be a scoping hearing on an emergency ventilation proposal for the Lexington Avenue subway. The Murray Hill area, especially along Park Avenue, will be particularly affected. If a Board member wishes to submit a comment or testimony before, during, or after the hearing, it should be clearly identified as a personal statement and not imply that it is a position taken by the Board. Mr. Eggers noted that it is a high priority of CB6 to monitor construction projects to ensure that they are done with the least disruption to the neighborhood in all regards, including noise, air pollution, traffic, and consequences of vibrations from construction work. The Murray Hill neighborhood has been dealing with the East Side Access construction issues for many years. On its eastern boundary there is the rehabilitation of the Midtown tunnel and throughout there is residential construction and utility construction. We will do the best to seek mitigation of the cumulative effects of these various disruptions.

Mr. Eggers expressed CB6's gratitude for the efforts of elected officials on matters of concern to CB6. Recent issues have included proposals for the L train which runs along the southern border of our district, maintaining the 20th Street bus stop, requesting traffic calming efforts in the Tudor City area, support for CB6 budget requests, and ensuring CB6 is

consulted on matters of interest that may have negative consequence to our district even when the projects are located outside our District.

The Chair thanked everyone who helped make CB6 Spring Reception a success. In particular he thanked Pam Vassil who supervised all aspects of the event from initial planning to the presentation of the final bills. He also thanked Phil Rothman and the staff of the Brotherhood Synagogue not only for the great space, but also for the tour of the Underground Railroad Site and overall hospitality. Thanks also to Bea Disman, Ronnie White, Mary Silver, Sarah Shamoon, Aaron S. Humphrey, Gary Papush, Larry Scheyer, Jesús Pérez, and Karen Ward-Gamble

Mr. Eggers also announced that Board Member Matt Roberts was recognized by the 17th Precinct as a Community Partner of the Year and informed the Board that Pam Vassil has been appointed as CB6 representative to the Flatiron/23rd Street Partnership.

District Manager's Report

CB6 DM Jesús Pérez reported on the joint CB6-CB3 meeting about the proposed repairs to the L Train tunnels. The MTA will make a presentation on June 29th, at 6:30 PM on the project and discuss the potential community impacts. He also wished everyone a great summer.

Treasurer's Report

CB6 DM Jesús Pérez, reporting for Treasurer Bea Disman, stated that all \$115,394 that CB6 had budgeted for rent has been spent. Of the \$178,437 budgeted for Personal Services (staff salaries) for FY 2016, \$118,587.90 has been spent. That leaves \$59,849.10. Whatever is not paid by the end of the month in salaries will be returned to the city. As for Other Than Personal Services (OTPS), \$79,818 is our street fair money (which will be rolled over to the upcoming FY 2017). \$20,100 was spent on temporary contractor services and \$5,505.70 has been spent so far in office expenses such as telecommunication services, office equipment and supplies. The remaining amount will be used on year-end purchases of office supplies and equipment and to the extent possible prepaying for services. Any amounts remaining at the end of the month will be returned to the City.

Borough President Report

Yissely Ortiz, from the office of the Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer thanked CB6 for welcoming her. She reported that Gale Brewer introduced a bill with CM Chin to revise procedures for lifting deed restrictions in response to the lifting of restrictions on Rivington House, a non-profit medical facility on the Lower East Side, and its subsequent sale to private developers. The Borough President also wants a database of these deeds. Yissely Ortiz spoke briefly on Friends Seminary Expansion, budget increase, BP's allocation of funds for health services and private schools, BP's Leadership Member Service Forum and CB reception, Manhattan Gay Pride Day, and Puerto Rican Day Parade. BP Brewer also put out a summer guide for all summer events. She is looking for a date in July to connect all Manhattan BIDs.

Special Committee

Nominating Committee – Louise Dankberg, Chair

Chair Dankberg reported on the Nominating Committee procedures and deadlines. All CB6 members running for a Board Officer position should submit their name no later than July 6. The committee will make its report at the September full Board meeting at which time additional nominations will be accepted. Elections will take place in October.

Committee Resolutions & Reports

1. Public Safety & Environment - Nick Smolney, Chair

Nick Smolney reported on water and sewer line projects, expressed interest in getting someone from the Mayor's Office to give an update on Vision Zero at the next committee meeting. He would also like LINK to come back to committee. He announced there will be no committee meetings in July and August

2. Budget & Governmental Affairs – Pedro Carrillo, Chair

Pedro Carrillo reminded other Committee Chairs and committee members to send in their budget requests and input on the District Needs Statement. He announced that the committee will meet in August.

3. Housing, Homeless & Human Rights – Rajesh Nayar, Chair

Rajesh Nayar reported that the committee will meet next Tuesday and spoke briefly on the recent meeting of the CAB for the 51st Street Shelter. The Shelter is developing a “friendly neighbor policy.” It has 127 beds running at full capacity. The site is dealing with employable individuals who receive training and have the goal of transitioning to permanent housing. The Committee is not scheduled to meet in July or August.

4. Parks, Landmarks & Cultural Affairs – Mark Thompson, Chair

Mark Thompson reported that two new members were at the committee meeting the previous night. Mark Vaccaro from the NY Parks Department gave an update on parks in our district. The work on the Stuyvesant Square Park fence is almost done. No meetings are anticipated in July and August.

5. Health & Education – Ahsia Badi, Chair

Ahsia Badi welcomed new committee members and reported on ACS and Foster Care. She also announced new programs that will focus on abused children’s emotional needs. Chair Badi wants ACS to attend more committee meetings and be more proactive in alerting the committee of any future incidents. Chair Badi also reminded the committee members and other Board members upcoming joint CB6/CB3 meeting on the Mount Sinai Beth Israel plans.

6. Land Use & Waterfront – Terrence O’Neal, Chair

Terrence O’Neal reported on concerns being addressed by the committee: 1. Open Space 2. Implications from Stuyvesant Town change in ownership 3. Citywide Ferry Service. He also announced that he had spoken to the Independent Budget Office on the possibility of attending the committee's meeting in July

7. Transportation – Sandra McKee, Chair

Sandra McKee reviewed resolutions 7b, with a small change in language from the distributed draft, and 7c. Both resolutions passed unanimously.

Chair McKee reported that the Park Avenue emergency ventilation project for the Lexington Avenue subway is currently proposed to go on for four years. There will be a scoping session later in the month. She reported on the SBS Select bus stops, bike lanes, CB6 resolution implementation, and the “Dangerous Intersections in CB6” survey on the CB6 website. Over 150 comments have been received to date. The Committee may meet in July to discuss Vision Zero and bike lanes with DOT.
