Board Chair Sandro Sherrod called the meeting to order at 7:25 PM. The agenda was adopted and the roll called.

Elected Officials

Arnis Serhati, representing the Office of Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney, reported their introduction of a family medical leave bill which employees in companies with more than 25 employees to take family and medical leave, now limited to companies with more than 50 employees. <https://maloney.house.gov/issue/family-and-medical-leave>

Liz Brown, representing the Office of NYS Senator Liz Krueger, reported on tenant-protecting upgrades to the rent stabilization code.

The next session in Senator Liz Krueger's Roundtable for Boomers & Seniors will take place on Thursday, February 20 from 8:30 to 10:00 a.m. at Lenox Hill Neighborhood House, 331 East 70th Street. It will focus on aging in the workplace.

Anna Pycior, representing the Office of Assemblymember Brian Kavanaugh, announced introduction of a bill which would allow local governments across New York State to raise the minimum wage in their area up to 25% above the state-mandated minimum wage. <http://www.briankavanagh.org/news/?p=15337>. The Assemblymember commended Mayor de Blasio's announcement that his administration will alter the City's practice of charging NYCHA for City services, for a \$52.5 million net increase in funding to maintain public housing. <http://www.briankavanagh.org/news/?p=15347>. He also announced the formation of a new caucus of NY State environmental legislators. <http://www.briankavanagh.org/news/?p=15322>

Matt Walsh, representing the office of Assemblymember Dan Quart, discussed setting up a meeting with CB6 and Turtle Bay Association regarding overnight construction in the vicinity of 51st Street and 2nd Avenue, and concern about idling MTA express buses. <http://assembly.state.ny.us/mem/Dan-Quart>

Eli Szenes-Strauss, representing the Office of Assemblymember Richard Gottfried, discussed the introduction of a new bill to install public address systems in high rise buildings to provide fire evacuation instructions. http://www.edgeboston.com/news/local/News/154076/hell%E2%80%99s_kitchen_high_rise_inferno_sparks_proposal_of_new_safety_legislation; <http://assembly.state.ny.us/mem/Richard-N-Gottfried/>

Vanessa Diaz-Lopez, representing the Office of Councilmember Rosie Mendez, stated that she has introduced a bill to further regulate after hours construction, and has reintroduced many other bills. <http://council.nyc.gov/d2/html/members/home.shtml>

Councilmember Dan Garodnick reported that he has been named Chair of the Economic Development Committee. In the newly unveiled Mayor's Preliminary Budget, he pointed out several major issues: the uncertainty surrounding Federal Hurricane Sandy recovery funds and NY State funding for pre-K education, the concerns raised by the Campaign for Fiscal Equity lawsuit http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Campaign_for_Fiscal_Equity; and the multitude of labor contracts that have been expired for years. He is joining CM Mendez as co-sponsor of a bill that would close a loophole allowing construction companies to work late at night and early in the morning as long as they get a variance from Department of Buildings that is now easy to obtain. The proposal would only allow for late-night or early-morning construction in case of emergencies or when the public safety is at risk. <http://therealdeal.com/blog/2013/11/04/manhattan-pols-want-to-stop-after-hours-construction/> He reiterated that he and CM Mendez would like to see the Police Academy become a school.

Sam Levine, Deputy Budget Director at the Office of Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, said that applications for capital funding are due by February 27. NYS Senator Brad Hoylman reported on his introduction of a bill to shine a light on Port Authority documents. <http://www.nysenate.gov/blogs/2014/feb/11/senator-hoylman-introduces-legislation-shine-light-port-authority-records> He is hosting a forum on Feb. 25 on implementation of "Vision Zero," the Mayor's plan to eliminate traffic fatalities within a decade. Business Session

Hearing no objections to the draft January Full Board minutes distributed to the Board, they were officially adopted.

Board Chair Sandro Sherrod noted that the meeting could not be live streamed but is being recorded. He announced that CB6 will co-sponsor the Vision Zero Town Hall on

February 25, from 6 - 8 PM. The Quality of Life Forum scheduled for Thurs. Feb. 13 will be postponed because of snow. District Manager Miner reported that the newly hired Community Associate will start work next week. There was no Treasurer's Report.

Committee Resolutions & Reports

By-Laws Special Committee

Chair Rick Eggers stated that the Committee met in January and February. The next meeting on March 6 the committee will review a draft implementing decisions made to date and will address any remaining items that must be addressed in this year's bylaws review. Summaries of decisions made to date are available in the minutes of the committee's January and February meetings.

Police Academy Repurpose Exploration Special Committee

Ahsia Badi, the Chair of the Special Committee, reported that the Committee had been in touch with Councilmembers Garodnick and Mendez. They are trying to determine exactly what City Agency owns the Police Academy facility and to arrange a tour. In recent news articles, Dept. of Education representatives alleged that a new school at this location is not needed. Several individuals asserted that this is inaccurate, and ignores a trend of more parents choosing to stay in Manhattan and send their children to public middle school instead of leaving the City. It is unclear how the Police Department might transfer control of the facility.

Budget & Governmental Affairs Committee

Chair Rick Eggers reported that the Committee last met on January 13. The discussion from that meeting is reported in the Committee minutes. The February Committee meeting and public hearing were cancelled because the Mayor's Preliminary budget was not released until February 12. Under the City Charter, the Board has 30 days from the release date to hold a public hearing and submit a response to the preliminary budget. The public hearing and committee meeting are expected to take place on March 10.

Housing, Homeless & Human Rights Committee

Chair Rajesh Nayar waived his report.

Health & Education Committee

Chair Ahsia Badi reported that Sen. Krueger's marijuana bill continues to evolve and the Committee will not issue a resolution on it at this time.

There is increased interest in the medical marijuana bill. They heard a presentation on the Take

Care NY program from Dept. of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH), which compiles information about public health concerns most evident in various NYC communities. She suggested that CB6 consider becoming a community partner of the program to help promote its public health initiatives.

Transportation Committee

Chair Molly Hollister will continue to collect information on hazardous intersections. The Committee's resolution in support of the City's adoption of LED lights was amended. A motion to call the question passed, and the motion carried.

He reported that St. Vartan Park is on hold, the Sutton Place South Park is nearing completion, the Asser Levy Park project is 9% done, a contractor has been selected for Stuyvesant Square Park, and that project should begin in early summer. He requested convening a Community Advisory Board meeting for Dag Hammarskjold Park by spring.

6a. Re: CB6 continued support: LED Street Lighting

WHEREAS, Energy-efficient LED lighting is widely recognized as one of the most cost-effective ways to reduce energy consumption. The potential for savings from efficient lighting is enormous for the City of New York; and

WHEREAS Benefits of LED's dramatically reduce energy consumption, greenhouse gas emissions, and air pollution; millions of dollars saved in electricity costs; and better lit streets and more productive spaces; and

WHEREAS, The largest LED Retrofit in the Country is in the City of New York, replacing all city street lights expected to deliver at least \$14 Million in savings annually; and

WHEREAS, The DOT has pioneered the application of energy-efficient lighting to both optimize and green its operations; and

WHEREAS, The DOT, PlaNYC, and other agencies of the City of New York have conducted studies and have cited studies that confirm benefits of cost effectiveness.

WHEREAS, The LED Retrofit in the City of New York, replacing all city street lights are specified by design to reduce light pollution and produce broad-spectrum "white" daylight output increasing safety and visibility. **Therefore be it**

Resolved, that Community Board Six urges the City Council to continue to support the initiative of creating goals of Reducing City Government's Carbon Footprint and **be it further**

Resolved, that Community Board Six urges the City Council continues to support the initiative of creating codes best for New York City's needs and adopt amendments to make significant gains in energy efficiency.

8a. Re: Certificate of Appropriateness - Pierpont Morgan Library and Annex and J.P. Morgan House

Whereas, the Pierpont Morgan Library and Annex (29-33 East 36th Street) and the J.P. Morgan House (225-231 Madison Avenue, aka "Morgan") is a designated individual landmark, and

Whereas, the Florentine Renaissance library annex was built in 1928 and the Italianate style mansion was built in 1852 with a neo-Renaissance style expansion constructed in 1888, and

Whereas, in 2004 during LPC approved expansion work the applicants installed 8 cctv mini dome cameras on an exterior wall mount with a tilt/pan zoom for the purpose of museum security, and

Whereas, there are 6 cameras placed on the exterior of the 231 Madison Avenue façade with 4 cameras on the Madison Avenue side painted to match the color of the brownstone and 2

cameras on the 37th Street side not painted as it was considered a secondary façade and 2 cameras placed on the SE & SW upper corners of the annex and painted to match the color of the exterior, and

Whereas, these camera placement were never approved by the LPC (resulting in a violation) and the Morgan now has applied for such approval, and

Whereas, based on a presentation by the Morgan, Community Board 6 has reviewed the application and photographs of the landmark with the cameras, now **Therefore, be it**

Resolved, that Community Board 6 (C.B. 6), Manhattan, endorses the installation of such security cameras as the Morgan Library and Annex and J.P. Morgan Residence, (29-33 East 36th Street, Block 866, lot 25) may find necessary for the security of its premises and collections, and **be it further**,

Resolved, that C.B. 6 endorses the removal of the violation placed on the Morgan for the failure to include the exterior security cameras in its renovation and reconstruction, from 2002 and 2006, in plans and drawings that it failed to file with the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission (LPC) but with the express understanding that the Morgan is now in compliance with LPC regulations, and **be it further**

Resolved, that premises regulated by the LPC, and that need enhanced security shall affirmatively consult with the LPC and shall, to best extent possible, utilize discreetly sized and designed electronic, and other, security equipment selected so as not to detract from the design and architecture of the designated building.
