September 9th, 2015 – 7:00 PM

Public Session

Board Chair Sandro Sherrod called the meeting to order at 7:08 pm.

There was no public hearing, the agenda was adopted, and the first roll call was conducted by Secretary Aaron S. Humphrey.

Public Session - Elected Representatives Reports

Sarah Diaz from the office of State Senator Liz Krueger spoke on the homeless issue as it impacts CB6, Murray Hill and Kips Bay. She has written letters to DHS, the NYPD and the Mayor's Office on behalf of CBs 5 and 6 asking for CAB meetings to better involve the community in the homelessness issue. She noted that Senator Krueger's September newsletter highlights her efforts on the community's behalf. Ms. Diaz also noted that Senator Krueger's Ninth Annual Senior Resource Fair will take place on October 22nd from 2 to 5 pm at Temple Emanuel at 1 East 6th Street. Amanda Wallwin from the office of State Assembly Member Dan Quart announced that AM Quart had recently introduced legislation with State Senator Daniel Squadron for body camera footage of encounters between police and citizens to be made available to the public through FOIL. She noted that Seattle, WA posts their own police body camera footage to YouTube with the faces of individuals and bystanders redacted, which would be an option here as well. Brice Peyre from the office of New York State Assembly Member Richard Gottfried also noted his concerns over the homeless issues in CB6 and his efforts in association with other elected officials and city agencies to relieve the conditions of the homeless and alleviate the impact on the community. He also noted that AM Gottfried commends the efforts of the Times Square Task Force in their efforts to curb the influx of topless individuals and costumed characters and their aggressive panhandling activities. He also announced a pet adopt-a-thon at the Union Square Petco on September 19 and 20th.

Dan Campanelli from the office of Comptroller Scott Stringer invited everyone to review the Comptroller's newsletter, drawing attention to the recent audit report on NYCHA maintenance and repairs. He noted that it took an average of 370 days to address critical safety issues in NYCHA buildings. Mr. Campanelli also drew our attention to the July, 2015 ClaimStat Alert on potholes in New York. He pointed out that the City of New York had paid out \$138M over a six-year period in pothole -related claims. Mr. Campanelli noted Mr. Stringer's September 6th Op-Ed in the New York Daily News regarding the homelessness problem in our city. Finally, he called our attention to the Comptroller's celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month with a reception at the Surrogate's Courthouse on September 30 from 6 to 8 pm. Laura Atlas from the office of Public Advocate Letitia James drew our attention to the August 23rd New York Times article on PA James's activities mid-term. The article points out that Ms. James has filed more lawsuits against city agencies than all three of her predecessors of the last 20 years combined. Two recent suits this summer include a suit against the Administration for Children's Services, questioning the treatment of children in foster care; and the Department of Education for the lack of adequate air-conditioning on buses carrying mentally disabled children during the summer. Rebecca Kriegman from the office of State Senator Brad Hoylman announced that Senator Hoylman is co-sponsoring legislation to combat wage discrimination in New York State. The bill would require any company seeking a contract or doing business with the state to publicly report their wage gap based on gender, race and ethnicity. She also announced that Senator Hoylman is hosting a free mammogram event for women over 40 who have not had a mammogram in the past year on September 24th from 8 am to 4 pm. It will take place in Project Renewal's Scan Van which will be parked outside Lincoln Towers on Amsterdam Avenue and 69th Street. No appointments are required.

On September 30th Senator Hoylman will be hosting the first of a series of roundtable discussions about the environment and the impact of the pesticide glyphosate on Monarch butterflies at NYU Law School, Vanderbilt Hall, from 6:30 to 8 pm. Senator Hoylman will also be hosting a shredding event on October 7th from 5:30 to 7:30 pm in Stuyvesant Town at 20th Street and First Avenue.

Howie Levine from the Office of Councilmember Dan Garodnick reported that CM Garodnick has allocated \$50K to install new lighting outside the 30th Street Men's Shelter to allay community safety concerns, which he expects to be installed this fall. In addition, in association with the Mayor's NYC Safe Plan, six new peace officers have been assigned to the shelter. The demographics of the shelter will transition from being made up of largely unemployed individuals to employed or employable individuals by the end of this year. He noted that there are currently fewer people on the streets surrounding the shelter during the day.

CM Garodnick is continuing to ask questions of the DSNY regarding the siting of the garage on the Brookdale site. He has also written a letter to the Independent Budget Office questioning the viability of locating the garage at the site, noting the community's many concerns.

Taylor Digby from the office of Council Member Ben Kallos reports that the Council Member is hosting two more community meeting on participatory budgeting in his district. CM Kallos sets aside \$1M of his budget allocation for the public to determine how best to spend in the district. The next events will take place on September 13 at 11:30 am at the Lenox Hill Neighborhood House and on September 19th at 1:30 pm at Lexington Houses.

There will also be a Town Hall Meeting on September 17th at 6:30 pm at Memorial Sloan Kettering at 430 East 67th Street involving multiple city agencies. CM Kallos is hosting an Emergency Preparedness give-away on September 30th at 7 pm at the Stanley M. Isaacs Neighborhood Center at 415 East 93rd Street where he will be giving away 100 Go Bags and 100 Go Bag Kits.

Matt Viggiano from the office of Council Member Rosie Mendez reported that CM Mendez is also concerned with quality of life issues in our district and he directed us to CM Mendez' September newsletter for further information. Ms. Mendez testified at the Annual Plan Hearing held by NYCHA on August 12 for NYCHA's Next Gen Annual Plan. She is also concerned with the increase in parking rate for NYCHA residents. Finally, Mr. Viggiano reports that CM Mendez is working with BRC, Coalition for the Homeless and Common Ground to identify their needs in extending their homeless outreach programs. Business Session

The adoption of the June Full Board minutes was laid over until next month to confirm accuracy of attendance.

Chair's Report

Board Chair Sandro Sherrod reported that the last free kayaking event at Stuy Cove will be Saturday, September 12, from 1 to 4 pm; and he will be in attendance. He thanked the LIC Community Boathouse for life jackets for the event. He also announced that the District Office's lease at 866 United Nations Plaza expires in six months and that the office is currently looking for an affordable replacement space of 2,000 square feet with a conference room.

Chair Sherrod announced that a symposium entitled Affordable New York: A Housing Legacy will be held at the Museum of the City of New York at 1216 Fifth Avenue on September 17 from 5:30 to 7 pm with a reception to follow. Finally, Chair Sherrod thanked everyone that helped out with board business over the summer.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Dan Miner reported on the activities of the office interns over the summer. They updated and expanded the survey of the over 70 privately owned public spaces in the district, conducted a survey of east midtown landmarks, participated in door-to-door outreach to east midtown businesses, as well as other research projects. The surveys are being edited now and will be available soon.

He also noted that the District Service Cabinet minutes are included in board members' packets. Mr. Miner advised us that our district office works to expedite complaints concerning bars, construction projects, chronic noise and trash issues, etc. Finally, he announced that many CB6 board members will be participating in this year's Park's Department annual tree census and invites the public to also join the training event which will be coming up in October.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Beatrice Disman reported that the OMB report of August 31, 2015 shows the 2016 PS budget is \$209,421; from which \$19,827.79 has been spent and \$189,593.21 remains. The modified OTPS total is \$100,292; of which \$79,818 is from the Street Fair Fund. \$20,474 remains in the budget.

Borough President's Report

Jesus Perez from Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer's office announced that in August the Borough President had held the first of many meetings to review and compare by-laws of the community boards throughout Manhattan. She has already noted variations amongst the boards and wants to standardize the by-laws for easier comprehension and execution and to reduce misunderstandings amongst the boards. He also announced that grant applications for the Manhattan Community Award Program for small grants for nonprofits and public schools are due in by September 10. Ms. Dankberg noted that members of the board may offer additional nominees from the floor, including themselves, but not members of the Nominating Committee. The floor was then opened for nominations. No other nominees were put forward and the above-listed nominees were approved unanimously as candidates to be voted on at the October Full Board meeting.

2. Business and Street Activities

Committee Chair Keith Powers thanked Matt Viggiano from the office of Council Member Rosie Mendez for his assistance to BASA regarding the reduction of space for sidewalk cafes for the businesses Tonic and Bank Café. He advised the board that Item 7e, the resolution on The Gem Saloon should be noted as the proprietors of The Gem Saloon had originally accepted a 2 am closing during the last BASA Committee meeting, but later advised Chair Powers that after conferring with their landlord they would need to remain open until 4 am. Chair Powers advised the board that the wording of the resolution has been amended from a ‘no objection’ based on a 2 am closing to an objection based on a 4 am closing. Items 7a, b, c and d were bundled and approved unanimously. Discussion continued on item 7e, with the amended language to be distributed by Chair Powers to the board office. Item 7e passed as amended, but not unanimously. Chair Powers waived his report.

Chair Ahsia Badi reported that the committee meeting has been moved to September 29th. The committee will be discussing the closing of the Mt. Sinai Beth Israel substance abuse program and the changes to the emergency department.

6. Housing, Homeless and Human Rights

Vice-Chair Susan Steinberg, speaking on behalf of Chair Raj Nayar, waived a report.

7. Public Safety and Environment

8. Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs

Vice-Chair Gary Papush reported for Chair Mark Thompson. Resolution 8a passed unanimously. Mr. Papush reported that at the next meeting the committee will be discussing the proposed changes to the landmarks law. He noted that there had been a hearing downtown today and that the chairman of the Landmarks Commission has realized the large opposition to the proposed changes and will consider ways to revise the proposed changes. He also reported that there are three buildings in CB-6 that are up for landmark status at the next Landmarks Commission hearing. He reported that the fence work at Stuyvesant Square Park is underway and that the Parks Department states that the work in 1 Sutton Place Park will begin in the spring of 2016.

9. Land Use and Waterfront

Chair Terrence O’Neal reviewed Item 9a, the renewal of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center resolution, which passed unanimously. He advised the board that on September 30 there will be a review for the committee of the East Midtown Zoning program. He noted that at the last committee meeting SAC gave an update on their activities in relation to opposition to the BauHaus super-scraper on 58th Street and Sutton Place, along with their efforts towards a ULURP application for the site. He noted that the Brookdale Coalition is forging ahead with their opposition to the sanitation garage on the Brookdale site and that it appears the EIS has been postponed for the present. The Land Use and Waterfront Committee may work jointly with the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee in locating additional open space in the district. The October committee meeting will include further discussion of the modifications made to the public space at Rivergate. Mr. O’Neal also reported that the EGAP board met regarding the MOU for the UNDC. There will be an effort to extend the MOU since it is unlikely the UN will meet on this topic during General Assembly this year. Finally, Mr. O’Neal spoke of the kayak launch on the East River.

WHEREAS, the applicant never did the work and the permit expired, and

Land Use & Waterfront

- a. **Twenty year renewal of an existing lease of two floors in the Board of Health and Mental Hygiene building, 455 First Avenue, to the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center (ADARC).**

WHEREAS, the New York City Economic Development Corporation (EDC) and the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center for the City of New York (ADARC), have agreed to the terms of lease renewal, and

WHEREAS, the lease is for ADARC's continued use of the 6th and 7th floors, totaling about 40,000 square feet in the Board of Health and Mental Hygiene (BHMH) building, 455 First Avenue (Block 932, Lot 17), within Community Board 6, Manhattan, for a period of up to twenty (20) years, and

WHEREAS, the site is zoned R-8 with a C2-5 overlay and ADARC lease does not contemplate any change in the existing laboratory use, and

WHEREAS, medical and health related laboratory and medical research uses are consistent with CB6's desire to encourage hospital facilities and uses, as stated in the 197a plan adopted by the Board, and

WHEREAS, that on the first anniversary of the lease commencement date the annual base rent shall be \$45 a square foot a year (\$150,000 a month). Thereafter, beginning on the second anniversary of the lease commencement date the annual rent is expected to increase on each anniversary of the lease commencement date by the Consumer Price Index adjustment, compounded each year of any lease term, now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board 6, (CB6) Manhattan, has no objection to the renewal of the lease by the Economic Development Corporation (EDC) to the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center (ADARC), with the terms and time period as stated above.
