Full Board Meeting Minutes

Board Chair Rick Eggers called the meeting to order at 7:12 pm. He introduced Secretary Kathy Thompson and District Manager for CB6, Jesús Pérez.

PUBLIC HEARING

Chair Eggers announced the Public Hearing on the East River Fifties Alliance/Sutton Place Zoning Text Amendment – Land Use Review Application N170282 ZRM. He noted that anyone wishing to speak should sign in using the yellow slips made available. He thanked New York Langone Medical Center for providing the space for the meeting and asked that all visitors be respectful of the hospital and patients. He also announced that after the public hearing there will be the usual opportunity for the public to speak during the public session of the regular meeting agenda. In order to speak during the regular public session, speakers must use a white sign-in sheet. Mr. Eggers then reviewed the basis for the public hearing on the East River Fifties Alliance/Sutton Place Zoning Text Amendment. He acknowledged that a public hearing is not required as part of the official process; but Community Board Six felt a public hearing would be beneficial to hear the community's concerns on this important issue. Mr. Eggers announced that there will be a joint CB6 and Manhattan Borough President public hearing on the ERFA/Sutton Place Zoning Text Amendment on Wednesday, June 21st, at 6:30 pm at the Japan Society at 333 East 47th Street. A Land Use and Waterfront Committee will be held following the meeting to discuss the proposal and consider a resolution on the topic at the meeting. Community Board Six will have a special full board meeting on Tuesday, June 27th, at 7 pm at the Japan Society at 333 East 47th Street to vote on the resolution presented by the Land Use and Waterfront Committee and conduct any other board items necessary. Christopher Rizzo of Carter, Ledyard and Milburn LLP, the legal firm representing East River Fifties Alliance (ERFA) gave a brief review of the zoning text amendment application and how it originated. He noted that Borough President Brewer, Council Member Ben Kallos, Council Member Daniel Garodnick and State Senator Liz Krueger are all co-applicants with ERFA in the zoning text amendment application. He noted that the zoning in this part of Manhattan is deeply flawed, the only area in Manhattan where an R10 zoning applies to the midblock area. This flaw has resulted in a 900 foot supertower that is currently under construction on East 58th Street. ERFA's proposal would establish contextual protections for the approximately ten block area, along with outlining plans to achieve more affordable housing in the neighborhood. He introduced urban planners Doug Woodward and Sandy Hornick of Sheldon Lobel, PC. Mr.

Woodward discussed the details of the text amendment, including how it will produce more affordable housing. Mr. Hornick reviewed maps and zoning overlays, demonstrating the zoning as it currently stands with the potential for many more mega towers and out-of-scale development, and what the neighborhood would look like under ERFA's zoning text amendment. They noted that they have been working on this project for two years and have worked closely with City Planning to address concerns that have been expressed by City Planning. Council Member Dan Garodnick spoke as a co-applicant of the zoning text amendment application. He noted that the application aims to preserve the neighborhood feel of the area, while allowing thoughtful contextual development and encouraging the creation of affordable housing. He explained that the catalyst for this proposal was the discovery by this neighborhood that the local zoning designation, R10, would permit a thousand-foot tower proposed for a site on 58th Street between Sutton Place and First Avenue, a building that would be entirely out of scale with the surrounding neighborhood. As local residents organized to fight the development proposed for that site, they discovered that there are other locations where similar development could take place. It became clear that what was needed was a thoughtful, comprehensive approach that would cover the entire neighborhood, not just the site that first brought this issue to prominence. So the residents formed a nonprofit group, raised funds, and hired lawyers and urban planners to put together a professional rezoning proposal for the area. Normally, such proposals are the province of the city administration or real estate developers. It is extremely unusual for a community group to create a fully-formed rezoning plan, and it is very impressive that this one did so.

Council Member Ben Kallos thanked all Community Board Six members, especially Board Chair Rick Eggers and Land Use and Waterfront Chair Sandro Sherrod for not only passing resolutions in support of the zoning text amendment, but for the speed with which the board has responded and organized to hold public hearings and additional committee and board meetings to address this important issue. Council Member Kallos then asked that all members of the audience who were in attendance in support of the zoning text amendment to stand. A large portion of the audience stood in support of the zoning text amendment.

Chair Eggers thanked CM Kallos' staffers Paul Westrick, Abby Damsky and Theodore Lauzare for their assistance with signing in those wishing to speak during the hearing.

Rachel Levy, Executive Director of Friends of the Upper East Side Historic Districts spoke in support of ERFA and the zoning text amendment. She noted that her organization is concerned with the preservation and livability of the Upper East Side and that their neighborhood also has endured the rise of the supertall buildings. She commends ERFA for their use of planning to preserve their neighborhood while balancing urban development.

Howard Youron spoke in support of ERFA's zoning text amendment, expressing his concern with the rise of the supertall towers, noting their out-of-scale positions in residential neighborhoods.

Robert Shepler, an ERFA officer and a resident of the Sutton Place area, noted that the coalition that makes up ERFA consists of nearly 2,000 people, with approximately 300 buildings, numerous civic organizations and four elected officials, who are co-applicants on the proposal. He noted that the application seeks to address a zoning anomaly that is 60 years old, while seeking responsible contextual growth and maintaining community diversity through the creation of affordable housing.

Bonnie Behrend, a 20 year resident of the Sutton Place area spoke in support of the ERFA application, noting that the supertall buildings will rob the neighborhood of light and air.

Marcel Nagret, Project Manager at the Municipal Art Society of New York (MAS), supports the Sutton Place rezoning proposal, which would prevent out-of-scale supertall towers from being built in this relatively low-rise neighborhood. He went on to review specifics of the current FAR as allowed under the current zoning text, explaining in detail how easy it is for supertall buildings to be built as the zoning text is now written. He also stated that while MAS supports the proposal, they feel it may be improved by an increase in affordable housing. The plan would require developers to set aside 13 percent of their buildings' residential floor area at or below 80 percent of the AMI. Mr. Nagret concluded by stating that MAS supports the ERFA plan that would provide much needed contextual protections in Sutton Place. The proposal also adds much needed affordable housing and community facilities to the area, and would employ design standards that are consistent with the existing neighborhood. He also noted that MAS strongly recommends that the City coordinate with the applicants to find more extensive affordable housing incentives. MAS urges the City to accept the EFRA proposal and work toward a sensible plan for properly regulating new buildings that cast our neighborhoods in shadow, obstruct views, and forever alter our skyline.

Rachel Honig, a neighborhood resident, spoke in support of ERFA's text amendment application.

Zachary Altman spoke against the megatower slated for development at 430 East 58th Street. He noted that developers are attempting to exploit a loophole in the zoning regulations of the neighborhood. He also noted that the Sutton Place community is the only community in the entire city without height protections on residential side streets and that what is being asked for by the East River Fifties Alliance is simply that the Sutton Place neighborhood be afforded the same protections that every other residential neighborhood in the city has. He supports ERFA's zoning text amendment application.

Mel Mackler, who lives in the Sutton Place area and who is a member of ERFA, spoke in support of the ERFA zoning text amendment and asked that City Council pass the amendment as soon as possible.

Danny Gold, who lives in the Sutton Place area, voiced his support of the ERFA plan.

Heather L. Bain, who also lives in the Sutton Place area, spoke in support of ERFA's text amendment.

As noted in Council Member Kallos' remarks, many people attended to show support for ERFA's text amendment application but did not speak in the public hearing.

The public hearing ended at 8:12 pm. Chair Eggers announced that there would be a brief 10 minute recess for the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee and the Health and Education Commission Committee to caucus, as well as for all newly appointed board members to meet briefly with Vice-Chair Claude L. Winfield. He announced that any members of the public who wished to stay for the continuation of the meeting are welcome.

Chair Eggers reconvened the meeting at 8:25 pm.

He conducted the swearing-in of all newly appointed board members by asking all board members to stand and take the oath of office together.

Public Session - Members of the Public

He also announced that there will be a ribbon cutting ceremony tomorrow at noon at Stuyvesant Square Park in honor of the newly restored fence. He noted that the board had been working on the restoration of the fence for thirty years; and he thanked Board Member Gary Papush, pointing out that he has been actively working toward the restoration for the entire time. Mr. Eggers thanked Council Member Rosie Mendez for her efforts to get the project completed, as well as Council Member Dan Garodnick and Borough President Brewer. He also thanked current Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Chair Mark Thompson for his efforts, along with the committee.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Jesús Pérez reported that the LINK console screens now display a notice of community board meetings. At the present time, Mr. Pérez has to submit the information to LINK each month; but they are working to make the postings more seamless. Mr. Pérez also reported that another office space had been being considered, but was unavailable by the time DCAS had acted upon it.

Treasurer's Report

Assistant Treasurer Brian Van Nieuwenhoven reported on behalf of Treasurer Beatrice Disman that the OMB Report from June 1, 2017 shows that of the Personal Services Budget of \$194,628, a balance of \$69,733 remains, with \$124,895 spent or obligated. The current budget for Other Than Personal Services excluding rent is \$129,911. The numbers are the same as last month: the balance is \$94,856, which includes Street Fair Funds of \$88,128. Without Street Fair Funds the balance is \$41,782, with \$35,055

spent or obligated and \$6,728 remaining. Finally, our rent budget is \$126,009 with the balance, again unchanged from last month, being \$22,627 and \$103,382 spent or obligated.

Chair Eggers noted that the office is currently not paying rent as it is now housed in the basement of the Candidate Assessment Center for NYPD, formerly the Police Academy, which is connected to the 13th Precinct headquarters.

Borough President’s Report

Lesley Almanzar from Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer’s office welcomed the new and reappointed members. The Borough President is inviting everyone to Community Board Leadership Training on June 23rd for an all day workshop at John Jay College. Information on training is in the newsletter. A public meeting was held on June 8th on the Mt. Sinai Beth Israel Downtown restructuring. BP Brewer will be releasing her Manhattan Supermarkets Report at the end of this week. a.) Re: Engaging Services of Communications Consultants for District Office

WHEREAS, a full time Community Associate in the Community Board Six District Office will be on leave through the remainder of calendar year 2017, and

WHEREAS, to ensure the proper functioning of the District Office, the Personnel Committee recommended engaging the services of temporary consultants, and

WHEREAS, District Manager Jesús Pérez conducted a search for such consultants, placed appropriate advertisements to attract applications, received and reviewed 57 responses, offered interviews to 12 applicants, and conducted interviews along with the Chair of the Board, and

WHEREAS, the District Manager has provisionally offered the positions to Samuel Carrigan and Cody Osterman, pending official approval of this action by a vote of the Board,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, Manhattan Community Board Six approves engaging the services of Samuel Carrigan and Cody Osterman.

2. Health and Education

a.) Re: An Act in relation to hospital Community Advisory Boards

Whereas, Bill No. A02379/S00576 would:

- Amend the PHL to (i) extend the requirement that voluntary non-profit general hospitals have a community service plan to apply to every general hospital in NYS, (ii) require every general hospital in NYS to have a community advisory board (“CAB”), and (iii) require each general hospital in NYS to involve its CAB in the preparation of the hospital’s community service plan; and;
- Amend the HHCA to (i) require New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation hospital CAB membership lists to be filed with the NYS Department of Health, and (ii) delete the \$25 per month limit on expense reimbursement for CAB members; and;

Whereas, general hospitals are vitally important institutions for communities and should be responsive to community needs, whether they are non-profit, for profit, or public institutions; and;

Whereas, public regulations, financial incentives, and, in the case of public hospitals, public ownership only go so far in helping to ensure that hospitals are mindful of and serve community needs; and;

Whereas, NYS requires voluntary non-profit general hospitals to periodically adopt and update a community service plan identifying at a minimum the populations and community served by the hospital and the hospital’s commitment to, and plan for, meeting the healthcare needs of that community, and there are good reasons to believe that it may be beneficial for all general hospitals in NYS and the communities that they serve for all general hospitals in NYS to follow this model; and;

Whereas, New York City's public hospitals are required to have CABs, and there are good reasons to believe that it may be beneficial for all general hospitals in NYS and the communities that they serve for all general hospitals in NYS to have a CAB; and;

Whereas, a CAB – especially to the extent that it is comprised of a group of volunteers that are (i) representative of the community served by the hospital, and (ii) dedicated, knowledgeable, informed and otherwise reasonably involved in the community served by the hospital – may help to further a hospital’s success, while encouraging accountability to the community that it serves, by, among other things:

- Providing information and advice to hospital administrators regarding healthcare-related needs of, and issues of interest and concern to, the community; and;

- Assisting in the adoption and updating of a meaningful community service plan that may benefit the hospital and the community that it serves; and;
- Acting as a community liaison, supporting a two-way dialogue between the hospital and the community that it serves, and helping to inform the community about the hospital's strategy and its healthcare-related offerings and programs; and;
- Helping to forge relationships and enhancing communication and knowledge sharing among patients, hospital staff and administrators, members of the community, and community organizations, which may assist in the provision of better healthcare for the community served by the hospital; and;

Whereas, the creation of CABs at every general hospital is a pressing need; and;

Whereas, hospital CABs provide co-equal participation and critical local input on individual hospital community service plans; and;

Whereas, while it is reasonable to amend the HHCA to revise the limit on expense reimbursement for CAB members (based on the data maintained by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, \$1.00 in January 1978 has the same buying power as \$3.85 in March 2017), in an abundance of caution it seems advisable, and may be more acceptable, to retain some reasonable limit on the amount of the permitted expense reimbursement, and, rather than delete (as proposed in Bill No. A02379/S00576) the words "up to and including twenty-five dollars", it may be advisable to instead amend those words as follows (or similar) (to raise the limit to a reasonable amount): "up to and including one hundred dollars";

Therefore, be it resolved, for the reasons described herein, Manhattan Community Board 6 recommends that the NYS Senate adopt Bill No. Senate S00576 and NYS Assembly adopt Bill No. A02379.

a.) RE: New OP Liq. Lic. for Fusha Fusion Restaurant Inc. dba Fusha Fusion Restaurant, 357 East 58th Street between First and Second Avenues

WHEREAS, Ms. Chunyang (Alice) Zhang, Esq. (Legal Representative) appeared before the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee of Community Board 6 Manhattan (CB6M) on May 27, 2017, CB6M having jurisdiction of the premises in the license application process, and

WHEREAS, this location is an Asian fusion food restaurant that has been operating in the neighborhood for the last seven years, and

WHEREAS, the restaurant is under new ownership, and

WHEREAS, there is no change in method of operations or hours of operations, and

WHEREAS, the latest the establishment is open is 11pm, and

WHEREAS, no members of the community had any comments for or against; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that pursuant to the presentation made by the Representative at the meeting of the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee held on May 27, 2017, and pursuant to all other considerations, CB6M has **no objection** to the application so long as the Applicant adheres to all the representations made by the Representative to the committee.

Whereas, The Mertz Gilmore Foundation has an extensive history of supporting dance in the city, reflecting Joyce Mertz Gilmore’s passion for dance. The Joyce Theater in Chelsea is named in her honor and;

Whereas, To support these efforts and to promote an equitable and sustainable city of vibrant communities, the Mertz Gilmore Foundation supports work in low-income neighborhoods that emerges from, and actively engages, local efforts while looking for opportunities to support collaborative campaigns and;

Whereas, The design goal for the project at 218 East 18th Street is to comprehensively renovate both the front and the rear of the building with a design that is respectful of the existing historic structure. The interior will be fully renovated in a way that restores the historic features of the building while modernizing and updating the facilities and;

Whereas, The exterior work in the front of the building will consist of installing a new ADA-compliant handicap lift for more inclusive access to the building. The lift is designed to blend in with the existing dark-bronze colored metal posts that coordinate with the brownstone color. The paint on the handrail, the gate, and the metalwork will be repainted in a black color that is in keeping with the other painted metalwork on the block and;

Whereas, The exterior work in the rear of the building will consist of enlarging an existing window to create an ADA-compliant door that leads from the meeting room and removing an existing step and re-grading the rear yard into one level, creating inclusive ADA access to the entire rear yard. The existing door from the pantry to the rear yard will be replaced with a new door in the existing location;

Whereas, through the efforts of a local resident, the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee has been offered a donation of a Little Free Library from a New Orleans Little Free Library contributor to be installed in Community District 6; and

Whereas, preliminary discussions with the President of Stuyvesant Square Park Neighborhood Association indicate that they are positively predisposed to the placement of a Little Free Library in Stuyvesant Square Park, and are willing to provide stewardship of the library; and

Whereas, the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee discussed the potential placement of a Little Free Library in Stuyvesant Square Park with the NYC Parks and Recreation Department and received positive feedback;

Therefore, be it resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six supports the installation of a Little Free Library in Stuyvesant Square Park; and

6. Housing, Homeless, and Human Rights

a.) Re: Intro 1556-2017 - in relation to a bill which proposes to increase the civil penalties for tenant harassment

Whereas, Residential rental real estate values continue to escalate for landlords and developers; and;

Whereas, Tenants, especially rent-regulated tenants, are vulnerable to harassment tactics by landlords and developers; and;

Whereas, Landlords and developers have targeted tenants in apartments with rents below market value and rent regulated apartment units in order to increase their rent rolls and/or potentially warehouse for development purposes; and;

Whereas, Metropolitan Council on Housing states tenant harassment has come in various forms: intimidation, withholding of services, and construction harassment; and;

Whereas, as of 2016 homeless statistics have been as high as 60,000 homeless individuals in New York City; and;

Whereas, Legislation to protect tenants from displacement caused by harassment would also prevent the increase in the number of homeless in New York City; and;

Whereas, the New York City Council proposed Intro 1556-2017, currently laid over, which would amend the administrative code to allow the court to issue an order restraining the owner of the property from further violations; and;

Whereas, Intro 1556-2017 would increase the penalties that a court can impose on a landlord to be no less than one thousand dollars and not more than ten thousand dollars for each dwelling unit in which a tenant or any person lawfully entitled to occupancy of such unit has been the subject of such violation; now;

Therefore, be it resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six supports Intro 1556-2017, Penalties for Tenant Harassment; and;

Be it further Resolved, that Community Board Six encourages New York City Council to consider any financial penalties be applied immediately to the building owner in the form of a lien on the property, causing the building owner to make remuneration to New York City promptly or risk foreclosure of the property.

Whereas, More transparency about the process of construction in inhabited dwellings is necessary to maintain quality of life of residents as well as reduce injuries and construction harassment, and;

Whereas, Int. 0960-2015 would require owners of multiple dwellings to post notice in multiple locations throughout the building with information about the construction work being performed, and;

Whereas, Posting would include contact information, a description of the work, locations within the building where the work is occurring, hours of constructions, projected timeline for completion, a description of the amenities and essential services anticipated being unavailable, and how distribution will be minimized, and;

Whereas, Posting will be provided in multiple languages, and;

Whereas, Enforcement of this posting will be performed by Tenant Protection Agency and Housing Preservation and Development, and;

Whereas, Penalties will be in accordance with Housing Maintenance Code §27–2115 which would subject a violator to a civil penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred fifty dollars a day depending on whether the violation is hazardous or non-hazardous violation and;

Whereas, Penalties shall commence from the date set for correction of the violation in the notice of violation and shall continue until the violation is corrected, and;

Whereas, Penalty for willfully making a false certification of correction of a violation shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than fifty dollars nor more than two hundred fifty dollars for each violation falsely certified, in addition to the other penalties provided above, now;

Therefore, be it resolved, that Manhattan Community Board Six supports Int. 0960-2015, in relation to creation of a safe construction bill of rights, and;

Be it further resolved, that Community Board Six strongly recommends that notices will be posted in common areas and/or public spaces in the building, and

Be it further resolved, that Community Board Six strongly recommends that notice requirements be included with the Department of Buildings permit process.

c. Declaration in support of New York City's position on undocumented immigrants

BACKGROUND: The issue of immigration has been polarizing for our Country, our State and our City. The 45th President has signed Executive Orders pertaining to immigrants from a list of countries viewed as terrorist and seeking a make a home in the United States—in our state and our city—and those he wishes to deport. Our Mayor has designated New York City as a Sanctuary City, protecting those coming and going. Both Executive orders are currently being litigated and other states (like Texas) are seeking to financially punish its sanctuary cities. Much is unknown at this point in time. Immigration has brought a rash of hate speech and action to our City.

Whereas, each Executive Order and subsequent required actions impinge upon every agency in our city and every aspect of city life; **and**

Whereas, Immigrants seeking citizenship or refugee and permanent resident status impact commerce, law enforcement, housing, medical facilities, immigration, litigation, Department of Justice ("DOJ"), local airports, education, child services, social workers, telecommunications, emergency services, etc.; **and**

Whereas, Immigrants selected for deportation **ALSO** impact commerce, law enforcement, housing, medical facilities, immigration, Immigration and Custom Enforcement ("ICE"), Litigation, DOJ, local airports, education, child services, social work, telecommunications, emergency services, etc.; **and**

Whereas, the children of immigrants are fearful about attending school where they might be identified as undocumented (reference New York City's Chancellor of Education Carmen Farina's letter); **and**

Whereas, the children of immigrants are fearful of returning home after school and finding parents and family members missing or being deported; **and**

Whereas, Immigrants have encountered vicious hate crimes with the national discourse providing the language and atmosphere to do so; **and**

Whereas, Community Board Six appreciates and celebrates the contributions made by immigrants, past and current, as well as its' citizens, no matter the country of origin; **and**

Whereas, New York City has a long, proud tradition of being home to immigrants and refugees seeking a political and economic foothold in the United States of America; **and**

Whereas, Community Board Six supports New York City's provision of safe harbor, after proper vetting, for all people seeking a new home regardless of country of origin; **now**

THEREFORE, BE IT
