Full Board Meeting Minutes

Board Chair Rick Eggers called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm. He introduced Secretary Kathy Thompson, District Manager for CB6, Jesús Pérez and First Vice-Chair Claude L. Winfield.

Chair Eggers announced that there would be a short recess after the election of officers for the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee and the Executive Committee to caucus.

The agenda was adopted.

The first roll call was conducted by Secretary Kathy Thompson.

Public Session - Elected Representatives and Agency Reports

Chair Eggers announced Public Session, explaining the procedure and reminded all speakers to keep to a time limit of three minutes.

Council Member Dan Garodnick reported on the activation of public realm improvements in the Greater East Midtown Rezoning plan by way of shared streets on 43rd Street between Lexington and Third Avenues. Business Session

The September minutes were adopted.

Chair's Report

Chair Eggers reminded everyone about the Town Hall tomorrow, Thursday, where residents of City Council District 2 have the opportunity to ask questions directly to the Mayor and to Council Member Rosie Mendez. You do not have to be a resident of that council district to attend and you should RSVP – seating will be limited and a large turnout is expected. You will also find the information in the most recent CB6 newsletter and on the Board website Events page.

Mr. Eggers also recommended that if there is anyone present who is not on the email list for the monthly CB6 newsletter, please go to the CB6 website – www.cbsix.org - to sign up. You should check the website often for the Board's calendar of meetings and the extensive Events page that lists other meetings and activities coming up.

Chair Eggers announced two recent appointments. Terry O'Neal, former Chair of the Land Use and Waterfront Committee, will be the CB6 representative on the Governing Group for East Midtown. This is the group that will supervise the fund for public realm improvements. The funds will include some initial seed money from the city, \$38M, and then additional contributions based on the sale of landmark development rights and other contributions from sites that include the redevelopment of overbuilt floor area. The group is composed of representatives of city agencies, the Borough President's office, the District 4 Council Member, and representatives from CB5 and CB6. Terry is uniquely qualified as he was one of the central participants on the Steering Committee on East Midtown Rezoning and is fully versed in the provisions of the rezoning and the concerns, both met and unmet, in the final zoning action.

Next, Mr. Eggers noted that the Business Affairs and Street Activities Committee may need a new chair after the November election for City Council. In preparation for a vacancy of the seat of chair, Mr. Eggers has named Kyle Athayde as "Chair in Waiting" for the Business Affairs and Street Activities committee. Kyle will assume the role of Chair in November should the vacancy arise. The committee usually has a full agenda dealing with liquor licenses and other licenses and permits. Kyle will work closely with the Board office and with the experienced members on the committee to improve the process of preparing resolutions, review how any processes may be streamlined, and identify how the committee can expand its activities to address the pressing concerns of small businesses in our community.

Mr. Eggers reported that on the agenda tonight is the District Needs Statement and Budget Requests. He thanked the members of the Budget and Governmental Affairs Committee, specifically Chair Pedro Carrillo, for all their work on this important set of documents. Putting the importance of this document in perspective, Chair Eggers noted that when he first joined the Board one of the highest priorities in our District Needs Statement was additional data, in a usable format, about a variety of measures that would assist the Board in planning and in supporting our requests. While CB6 was not the only group advocating for this data - our Borough President in particular can be

credited with pushing for its availability when she was on the City Council - the situation is vastly improved now. As an example, he recommended to members of the public and to Board Members specifically, the recently revamped City Portal from City Planning. It provides access to interesting data about our district including:

- Key demographic characteristics
- Over 10 indicators illustrating a snapshot of socio-economic and select service performance indicators
- Maps showing the district's land use, zoning, facilities, and floodplain (all on one page)
- A ten year archive of Statement of Community District Needs, including the latest district needs
- A list of active and completed land use applications via DCP's LUCATS database – including applications that have not yet been certified and sent to the Community Board for review
- A one-page summary of the district profile (available in the resources section)
- Downloadable data and other mapping resources in various file formats

One fun fact is that CD6 had an estimated population in 2015 of 146,500 residents. Mr. Eggers noted that his home town of Syracuse, NY has a population of just 145,000. So if you ever wonder whether the issues addressed by the board for this district have any real importance, consider the fact that this board represents a population of a small city.

A reminder that to be eligible to vote in the general election on November 7th, your application must be received no later than this Friday, October 13th; and Friday is also the deadline to change your party enrollment for 2018.

Board Member Jim Collins introduced Scout Richard Toledo of Boy Scout Troop 422. Richard is attending tonight's meeting as a requirement for his citizenship badge.

Chair Eggers then announced that this will be his last meeting as Chair, as he is stepping down for medical reasons. He will take the time needed to focus on this, which means that he may not be able to give the Board business the attention it deserves. He will continue on the rolls as an active member of CB6 until April and perhaps beyond; and he thanked everyone for their kind thoughts and expressions of concern.

He pointed out that the timing of this causes a bit of a glitch in the Board election. He has discussed the situation with First Vice-Chair, Claude L. Winfield, Second Vice-Chair Molly Hollister, and the entire Executive Committee, as well as consulting the Borough President's office. The Executive Committee has agreed upon a procedure which will result in the least disruption to the functioning of the Board.

Chair Eggers then announced that Claude L. Winfield will assume the position of Acting Chair as of tomorrow and through the end of the calendar year. As Acting Chair, Claude will have the full duties and responsibilities of the office of Chair on all matters that come up to the Board. He noted that Claude has declined to accept the position of Chair, but has agreed to perform the duties of Chair for a limited time.

Mr. Eggers also announced a Special Election to fill a vacancy in the position of Chair with that election to be held at the December full Board meeting. He called for the special election under the authority of the Bylaws of Community Board Six, Section III (D)(3) which states that a special election shall be held when deemed necessary by the Chair of the Board, or by a majority vote of the Board, to ensure the efficient functioning of the Board. Claude Winfield will continue in the role of Acting Chair until a new Chair begins their term on January 1, 2018. Pursuant to Section III (D)(4) of the bylaws, nominations for the special election will be taken at the December full board meeting followed by the election at that meeting. All members of CB6 are eligible to run for the position of Chair and may nominate themselves or may be nominated by someone else. Members are free to discuss their candidacy at any time to ensure that Board Members are informed about who will be running for the position. He then asked if there are any questions about any aspect of the special election.

Chair Eggers then thanked the Board for the opportunity to be Chair for the last two years, noting that although being Chair can be frustrating and down-right infuriating at times, it is also interesting, rewarding and challenging. Professionally, it has been one of the most interesting experiences he has had. He will speak with members individually to express his gratitude for their support. Mr. Eggers appreciates that the Executive Committee managed their individual responsibilities with the skill and attention we expect at CB6. Some of the more experienced members of the board who are not on the executive committee provided their expertise and support whenever Mr. Eggers needed it. He gave special thanks publicly to District Manager Jesus Perez, who does far more for this Board than anyone other than a Chair of the Board would know.

Chair Eggers closed his report by saying that it has been an honor serving as Chair of CB6 and he sincerely thanks everyone for the opportunity. It is possible he will return to active membership on the Board in a few months, and looks forward to that time.

The board and the public in attendance gave Chair Eggers a standing ovation.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Jesus Perez reported that we continue to have difficulty securing permanent office space, having lost three spaces during Mr. Perez' tenure alone; although DCAS has lost several other spaces prior to Mr. Perez's tenure. Apparently, OMB has a problem with the cost of the East 43rd Street space, an issue related to the cost of useable square feet versus rentable square feet.

He noted that the board office, as well as all of Manhattan's Community Board district offices, were recently audited by the Equal Employment Practices Commission (EEOC). They are empowered by the City Charter to review all City Agencies' Equal Employment Opportunity Programs. Manhattan's Community Boards follow the Borough President's EEO program, and we were found to be compliant with all of the EEOC's standards except the accessibility of our office, as our office is not wheelchair or walker accessible. Mr. Perez must now draft a statement that details how and when we intend to become compliant with the accessibility standard. If the EEOC is unsatisfied with our response, they reserve the right to monitor us until we become compliant. As other agencies (OEM) have been sued for not being ADA accessible, Mr. Perez has impressed upon the Mayor's office that this matter with the office needs to be finalized quickly.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Brian Van Nieuwenhoven reported that the OMB Report from October 1, 2017 shows that of the Personal Services Budget for FY2018 of \$211,437.00, a balance of \$186,651.45 remains, with \$24,785.55 spent or obligated. The current budget for Other Than Personal Services excluding rent is \$118,102.00. Included in this is \$88,128.00 of our Street Fair Funds, with a remaining Other Than Personal Services budget of \$29,974.00; with a remaining balance of \$5,891.13 and \$24,082.87 spent or obligated.

Finally, our rent budget for the year is \$126,007.00 and we continue to have all of it available to use, with no rent obligations for our temporary office accommodations.

Board Member Letty Simon suggested that the new board chair meet with District Manager Perez and DCAS to attempt to move the finalization of permanent office space forward.

Borough President's Report

Lucille Songhai from Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer's office announced that CB6 Community Liaison Lesley Almanzar had delivered a baby boy named Dylan. Ms. Songhai will be working with CB6 until Ms. Almanzar returns in April. She reminded everyone of the October 18th City Planning Commission public hearing on the ERFA rezoning proposal. Ms. Songhai noted that Open House New York is coming up this weekend with a tour of the cupola of the Municipal Services Building being on offer, as well as the Map Room of the Borough President's Office. Chair Eggers called a recess at 8:25 pm for the Executive Committee and the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee to caucus, as well as for the Nominating Committee to tally the ballots.

Chair Eggers reconvened the meeting at 8:34 pm. A resolution for the Parks, Landmarks and Cultural Affairs Committee that had just been caucused on was distributed; as well as a resolution from the Transportation Committee, which had been late in arriving for distribution.

Ms. Badi announced that the vote count was completed and that each candidate had won their positions.

1. Health and Education

Resolution Recommending New York City Council Passage and Mayor Signing into Law of Intro. 799A: A Local Law in Relation to the Commercial Rent Tax and Intro. 1472: A Local Law in Relation to Exempting Certain Grocery Stores from the Commercial Rent Tax

WHEREAS, the City of New York imposes a tax on the rent paid by a tenant in commercial space south of 96th Street in Manhattan and north of Murray Street where the annual rent exceeds \$250,000; after allowing for certain statutory adjustments, and subject to certain exemptions and partial credits, the commercial tax rate is 3.9% of the base rent; the threshold for the imposition of the commercial rent tax (the “Tax”) has not been adjusted since 2001;

WHEREAS, the City of New York and the State of Florida are the only jurisdictions in the United States still employing a version of a commercial rent tax;

WHEREAS, because the tax only applies in Manhattan between 96th Street and the Financial District, it puts an unfair, regressive burden on businesses in Manhattan Community District 6 as well as many of the city’s other neighborhoods where there is immense upward pressure on commercial storefront rents;

WHEREAS, our small businesses operate in one of the most competitive and challenging markets anywhere in the nation, and in a typical commercial lease in Manhattan, the landlord passes along to its commercial tenants some or all of the real property taxes on the premises, or at a minimum some or all of increases to the real property taxes during the lease term;

WHEREAS, full service grocery stores – also known as supermarkets - are low profit margin neighborhood businesses that are essential to providing local access to a range of affordable fresh foods and staples for home preparation and consumption, especially for older adults and families;

WHEREAS, Commercial Rent Tax reform is applicable throughout Manhattan Community District Six but also is a borough-wide and city-wide issue of concern as many who live outside the CRT zone work, study, or visit the CRT zone and shop in the CRT zone;

WHEREAS, Intro. 799A proposes to raise the threshold for the imposition of the Tax from \$250,000 to \$500,000, and to make certain other amendments to increase certain partial credits and adjustments to the Tax. As of tax year 2016, the increase in the threshold would have made about 3,400 fewer businesses subject to the Tax, with a savings of \$45.9 million;

WHEREAS, Intro. 1472 was crafted to resemble the FRESH program’s insistence on produce, fresh meats and dairy; stores that seek the CRT exemption must accept SNAP and WIC, while earning the majority of their revenue from the sale of grocery items;

WHEREAS, Intro. 799 and Intro. 1472 have received wide range of citywide support from a broad-based coalition of elected officials, businesses organizations, and owners;

WHEREAS, while small businesses in our District and Borough face many more challenges to their survival and are in need of a far more comprehensive approach to supporting and sustaining these vital elements of our local economy and sources of employment, the measures cited above are an important first step in leveling the playing field for these small and low profit margin businesses;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Manhattan Community Board Six urges the New York City Council to pass Intro. 799A and Intro. 1472 and the Mayor sign them into law before the close of the current City Council legislative session in December 2017.

Resolution Opposing the Certificate of Appropriateness for Proposed Exterior Storefront Alterations for 275 Madison Avenue

WHEREAS, Misra & Associates PC, architects, representing 275 Madison Avenue RPW1 LLC, presented plans for modifying the landmarked building at 275 Madison Avenue to CB6’s Parks, Landmarks, and Cultural Affairs committee;

WHEREAS, the proposed change consists of permanently removing a portion of an exterior window and art deco trim on the 40th Street side of the building in order to create an additional entrance for retail use;

WHEREAS, the architects explained that the new owners needed to permanently remove the art deco façade in order to enhance their retail tenant options;

WHEREAS, alterations to a doorway on the Madison Avenue side of the building were just made in April of 2016, requiring a Landmarks Certificate of Appropriateness;

WHEREAS, 275 Madison Avenue is an outstanding example of Art Deco architecture, designed by Kenneth Franzheim as a ‘stage setting’ with a compelling black-and-silver color scheme and rich abstract ornamentation;

WHEREAS, the bus stops will be used for drop-offs only, five times per day between the hours of 9 AM and 1 PM;

WHEREAS, a Mercedes Setra Silver 56 passenger Motorcoach and a 2016 Volvo 9700 56 Passenger Motorcoach will be used in rotation for daily shuttle service between Manhattan and the Hamptons;

WHEREAS, the applicant operates fewer buses and stops than the previous owner and cannot increase the frequency or number of buses without DOT approval;

WHEREAS, the fleet is maintained by full-time ASA certified mechanics in an applicant owned and operated service shop. The mechanics make sure that all of the vehicles are operating properly, checking the air conditioning systems regularly, as well as performing regularly scheduled maintenance;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Manhattan Community Board Six has no objection to the applications for two intercity bus stops at 631 Third Avenue and 829 Third Avenue by M & V Corporate Transportation, Inc. dba Hampton Luxury Liner.

Resolution Requesting the Department of Transportation implement Alternate Left-Turn Proposals for Protected Bike Lanes

WHEREAS, traffic engineering changes by New York City Department of Transportation (DOT) to First Avenue and Second Avenue that began in 2010 have created a smoother and steadier-moving flow of traffic for Select Bus Service (SBS) and local buses, as well as for private and commercial vehicles, created a safer path for bicyclists, and introduced pedestrian refuge traffic islands adjacent to the bike path that make it easier to cross these wide streets;

WHEREAS, Manhattan Community Board 6 (CB6) has emphasized the need for bike lane protections and requested that DOT address the critical gaps in the parking-protected bicycle path on Second Avenue, and called for additional means of physically separating bikes and vehicles whenever their paths might come into conflict;

WHEREAS, CB6 has asked for more enforcement to address unsafe moving vehicle incursions into bike lanes and illegal parking/standing/stopping in bike lanes – which cause unpredictable cyclist reactions and, sometimes, crashes;

WHEREAS, the installation of dedicated bike-only signals working in tandem with dedicated left turn signals, currently operating at six major intersections in the community board district, have already made these intersections safer for cyclists and pedestrians;

WHEREAS, at intersections without bike-only signals, motorists intending to turn left enter turning bays that end in mixing zones with bicyclists;

WHEREAS, requiring cyclists and turning drivers to negotiate for the same space can be dangerous because, in practice, it is often unclear who has the right of way, and motorists accustomed to looking out only for pedestrians at intersections often are not paying attention to the cyclists on their left side as they turn into their path;

WHEREAS, improvements can be made to intersections having unsignalized turning bays including: (1) lessening the angle of the lane in a left turn bay where it approaches the stop line to make it parallel to a clearly-marked, adjacent bike lane, which is the configuration at major intersections; (2) extending the green paint bike path street marking across the intersection to provide a strong visual cue to drivers about bicyclists' intended path; (3) adding reflective bollards and other protective lane separators to better physically separate cyclists and motorists where there is not sufficient space to maintain a parking-protected bike lane and (4) adding dedicated bike-only traffic signals at major intersections;

WHEREAS, CB6 has been advised that Manhattan Community Boards 3, 4, 5, and 7 have passed resolutions making similar safety recommendations;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Manhattan Community Board Six urgently requests the New York City Department of Transportation to lessen the danger of left

turning motorists hitting cyclists and pedestrians on streets where there are curbside bike lanes, as follows:

- (1) lessen the angle of intersection between the paths of motorized traffic and cyclists so that left turning vehicles will have a clearer view of the presence of cyclists and pedestrians in the crosswalk;
- (2) install reflective bollards, or more permanent barriers, separating the bike lane and the turning lane as far as possible before the turn, requiring drivers to make close to a 90-degree left turn;
- (3) extend the bike lane's green paint through the intersection, in the same way that a crosswalk visually extends the sidewalk to the other side of the street;
- (4) add as many additional dedicated bike/left turn traffic signals as possible.
