Full Board Meeting Minutes

Acting Board Chair Claude L. Winfield called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm. He introduced Secretary Kathy Thompson and District Manager for CB6, Jesús Pérez.

The agenda was adopted.

The first roll call was conducted by Assistant Secretary David Colby Reed.

Public Session - Elected Representatives and Agency Reports

Acting Chair Winfield announced Public Session, explaining the procedure and reminding all speakers to keep to a time limit of three minutes.

Council Member Rosie Mendez announced that while she may be able to attend the December CB6 meeting, it is possible that this may be her last visit to CB6. She brought along her final newsletter to distribute. She reported that she will be hosting a presentation and discussion on the proposed conversion of East 33rd Street from a one-way to a two-way between First and Second Avenues on Thursday, November 16th, from 6 to 8 pm at The Rose Room at Bellevue Hospital Center. She also announced a street co-naming for Ms. Magazine will be on November 15th, which marks the 45th Anniversary of the magazine. The unveiling will be presented on the southeast corner of East 32nd Street and Third Avenue, at 11:00 a.m. Ms. Mendez also recently assisted in the co-naming of East 19th Street between Second and Third Avenues as Mother Cabrini Way. State Assembly Member Brian Kavanagh announced that he has been elected to the State Senate seat for lower Manhattan and part of Brooklyn. He won't be seated until January, 2018. He will then resign as Assembly Member and will not be representing CB6 as a State Senator. The vacancy of his Assembly seat will be filled by the Governor during a special election. Council Member Ben Kallos announced that he is pleased to have been re-elected. He thanked CB6 for their resolution in favor of open budgets. City Council has now passed a law on the topic, and budgets are now in the open data portal. He also thanked CB6 for their work with the East River Fifties Alliance (ERFA) application for re-zoning of the Sutton area. The ERFA application is now with the City Planning Commission after several delays by City Planning. He engaged with District Manager Perez on the office's

difficulties in securing suitable permanent office space. Mr. Kallos pledged to communicate with DCAS to assist in the matter. Finally, Mr. Kallos congratulated Board Member Keith Powers on his election to City Council. For more information please go to: <http://benkallos.com/>.

Vanessa Diaz-Lopez from Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer's office thanked Council Member Rosie Mendez for her twelve years of service. She joined the Borough President's office in October as Budget Director. Ms. Diaz-Lopez thanked CB6 for their support with the Washington Irving High School construction issues. David Leeds from Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney's office reported that the House Committee on Judiciary recently approved Ms. Maloney's legislation 'Stopping Abusive Female Exploitation (SAFE) Act'. This legislation would increase the federal penalty for female genital mutilation from 5 years to 15 years in prison and encourage states to implement reporting requirements for suspected genital mutilation. Brice Peyre from New York State Assembly Member Dick Gottfried's office reported that Mr. Gottfried had recently joined Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney at Bellevue Hospital Center to publicize the new open enrollment period. Business Session

Acting Chair Claude Winfield called a recess at 8:10 pm for the Transportation Committee to caucus.

The meeting was reconvened at 8:17 pm.

The October minutes were adopted

Chair's Report

Acting Chair Winfield waived his full report; but did announce that he had spoken to Former Chair Rick Eggers this morning and that he is recuperating from a medical procedure. Mr. Eggers requests that board members send any emails related to community board business to Mr. Perez in the board office or to Mr. Winfield. Mr. Winfield also reported that each board member's envelope contains a board roster with members' email addresses. These email addresses are not to be shared outside of the board. He also noted that all board members must be on two committees. If a member has not yet chosen two committees, Mr. Winfield will assign committees.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Jesús Perez reported that there has been a bit of progress in recent weeks on the office search. As has been previously reported an office space is under consideration, which Mr. Perez, Acting Chair Claude L. Winfield, Board Members Sandro Sherrod and Pedro Carrillo toured a few weeks ago. Mr. Perez has come to a better understanding of the steps that remain in the process from DCAS's real estate contractors and has found some places where some time can be shaved off the process—by completing certain steps simultaneously, as opposed to consecutively. This will make it easier to request assistance from elected officials' offices as there will now be specific requests that they can help expedite. He thanked Acting Chair Winfield for his initiative in reaching out to elected officials to secure their help. He also thanked Council Member Garodnick, who called the OMB point person to advocate on the board office's behalf.

In June CB6 welcomed two temporary consultants to the District Office. Their contracts will expire at the end of the year. As the office needs to maintain appropriate staffing levels, a search was conducted for a non-temporary employee. The current temporary consultant, Cody Osterman, emerged as an ideal candidate for the permanent position. The Personnel Committee will present a resolution to approve his hiring later in the meeting.

Mr. Perez reported that two weeks ago he convened his monthly District Service Cabinet meeting, which is a meeting that District Managers convene at which city agencies and elected officials discuss the delivery of services in the community district, as well as any particularly vexing service requests. One of the requests discussed concerned some overzealous ticketing of homeowners on East 18th Street by the Department of Sanitation. It appears as if people are littering on the sidewalk and the property owners are being ticketed for not keeping their sidewalks clean. The Superintendent of this district said that property owners are responsible for keeping their sidewalks clean, whether they made the mess or not, but that they should be particularly diligent from 8-9 AM and 6-7 PM, as that's the times during which inspections are done and tickets are written for dirty sidewalks.

Finally, DM Perez noted that the office is aware of the missing street light on Gramercy Park West and is working with the appropriate agencies to get the situation rectified as soon as possible.

Treasurer’s Report

Treasurer Brian Van Nieuwenhoven reported that the OMB Report from November 6, 2017 shows the Personal Services Budget for FY2018 is now \$195,379.00 adjusted from last month, with a balance of \$164,298.55; with \$31,080.45 spent or obligated.

The current budget for Other Than Personal Services excluding rent has gone up to \$141,933.00. There was \$16,002.00 added to this budget category from the Personal Services category to help fulfill the contracts we have with temporary staff. Those temporary workers are paid out of OTPS and are taking the place of full-time staff positions that we currently do not have. This transferred money is being spent on similar needs out of a different budget pool. It already is full obligated to the staff contracts, and is being dispersed as our employees are paid salary.

Another adjustment is that the Street Fair Fund is now increased to \$95,957.00.

With these adjustments, the Other Than Personal Services budget without the Street Fair Fund is now \$45,976.00, with a remaining balance of \$5,891.13; plus \$40,124.87 spent or obligated.

Finally, our rent budget AND rent balance for the year is still \$126,007.00 as CB6 remains in free basement office on East 20th Street.

3. Budget and Governmental Affairs

Chair Pedro Carrillo reported that his committee had successfully submitted the district needs and budget requests on October 31st. He also reported that at the next committee meeting a discussion will be held on a package of bills being considered by City Council on reforming Fair Share analysis.

4. Health and Education

Chair Ahsia Badi reported that the Kips Bay Library is working with Bellevue Hospital Center for senior programming and injury and fall prevention.

5. Executive

Vice-Chair Molly Hollister made a motion to rescind Resolution 12I New OP License for An Entity to be formed by Aristotle Hatzigeorgiou, 230 East 51st Street, West Store, between Second and Third Avenues, which was approved at the October 11, 2017 Full Board meeting. The motion was seconded by BASA Acting Chair Kyle Athayde. District Manager Perez explained that the applicant had appeared at the September 28th BASA committee meeting with the result being that the applicant had agreed to place a signed change agreement on file with board office. The board voted to oppose the application as the board was advised a signed change agreement had not been filed with the board office. Board Associate Cody Osterman had attended the committee meeting to record the proceedings, and, after reviewing the recording, it was realized that the applicant had not been instructed at the meeting of the requirement to provide a signed change agreement to the board office.

The resolution was called to question by Board Member Jim Collins and seconded by Board Member Brian van Nieuwenhoven. The motion to rescind the resolution passed. Acting Chair Claude Winfield advised the board that the recension vote is not recorded as a resolution.

Mr. Athayde noted that there will be a public hearing on SAPO on November 21st at 10am for all those wishing to get their comments on record. Outgoing Chair Keith Powers thanked Mr. Athayde for his leadership.

Resolution approving the hiring of a full-time Community Associate for the CB6 District Office

WHEREAS, a full-time Community Associate in the Community Board Six District Office is on leave through the remainder of calendar year 2017;

WHEREAS, another full-time Community Associate resigned in the summer of 2017, leaving insufficient time to conduct a search for a replacement before CB6’s Full Board hiatus;

WHEREAS, to ensure the proper functioning of the District Office, the Personnel Committee recommended hiring a full-time Community Associate;

WHEREAS, Section 2800(f) of the *New York City Charter* empowers Community Boards to “utilize the services of ... professional staff and consultants” in the fulfillment of their Charter-mandated duties;

WHEREAS, District Manager Jesús Pérez conducted a search for a Community Associate, publicly posted notice of the assignment, received and reviewed 98 responses, and conducted interviews with 6 applicants, keeping the Personnel Committee apprised throughout the process;

WHEREAS, the District Manager has provisionally offered the position to Cody Osterman, pending official approval of the action by a vote of the Board;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Manhattan Community Board Six of the City of New York approves hiring Cody Osterman as a full-time Community Associate.

Resolution Supporting a Certificate of Appropriateness for window replacements at The Beaux Arts apartments at 310 and 307 East 44th Street

WHEREAS, the ownership of 307 and 310 East 44th Street (aka The Beaux Arts Apartments), twin residential buildings that are designated as landmarks, has applied to the Landmarks Preservation Commission for a Certificate of Appropriateness to perform a building-wide window replacement;

WHEREAS, the existing windows have been in place since the buildings were constructed and have deteriorated significantly;

WHEREAS, the replacement window program was developed in conjunction with the Landmarks Preservation Commission staff;

WHEREAS, Manhattan Community Board Six has reviewed the proposed work subject to the Certificate of Appropriateness and found it appropriate;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Manhattan Community Board Six supports approval of the Certificate of Appropriateness.

Resolution Supporting a Certificate of Appropriateness for the conversion of a multi-family home to a single family home with non-visible horizontal/vertical enlargements at 109 E 35th Street

WHEREAS, the ownership of 109 East 35th Street, a multi-family home that is being converted to a single-family home, has applied to the Landmarks Preservation Commission for a Certificate of Appropriateness for the installation of non-visible horizontal/vertical enlargements;

WHEREAS, the building is within the Murray Hill Historic District;

WHEREAS, the proposed changes include the enlargement of rear openings, the addition of a greenhouse on the ground level at the rear of the building, installation of some small appurtenances on the rear façade, the creation of a small penthouse, none of which are visible from the public thoroughfare;

WHEREAS, the existing transom window over the front door will be replaced with an historically appropriate fan window;

WHEREAS, the applicant has agreed to meet with the Murray Hill Neighborhood Association prior to the Landmarks Preservation Commission hearing;

WHEREAS, Manhattan Community Board Six has reviewed the proposed work subject to the Certificate of Appropriateness and found it appropriate;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Manhattan Community Board Six supports the approval of the Certificate of Appropriateness.

Resolution Supporting the Proposed Design for the Renovation of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza

WHEREAS, the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation (NYC DPR) presented its plans for the proposed renovation of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza to the CB6 Parks, Landmarks, & Cultural Affairs committee;

WHEREAS, the proposed changes include painting of metal fences and pavilions, repair of pavement in various locations, new benches, tree replacement, repairs to the electrical services, inground lighting on the sculpture platform, and a new ADA-accessible entrance to the Katherine Hepburn Garden;

WHEREAS, the budget for the renovation is \$675,000, and is the first renovation since the plaza was built in the 1990s;

WHEREAS, the proposed design has been presented to the Friends of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza;

WHEREAS, members of the Committee and public expressed concerns over multiple issues (e.g., fountain repairs, access to water for the plantings) that NYC DPR has agreed to address;

Resolution Opposing the Continuation of the Moratorium on Street Fairs into Calendar Year 2018

WHEREAS, over two hundred SAPO-permitted street fairs and over 5,000 events occur annually within New York City. Almost all of these events involve permits for the use of multiple blocks over several days, the erection of structures, the vending of food, apparel, other goods, and the use of amplified sound;

WHEREAS, such events require additional police presence and increased overtime expenditure by the City;

WHEREAS, the New York City Police Department has requested for the calendar year 2018 that SAPO exercise its discretion temporarily to deny permits for additional events that place an excessive burden on police resources and divert uniformed personnel from core crime fighting, public safety and counter terrorism duties;

WHEREAS, the proposed moratorium authorizes SAPO to deny permits only to events that were not held in calendar year 2017;

WHEREAS, under the proposed moratorium, events that received permits in calendar year 2017 will be eligible to receive permits again in calendar year 2018;

WHEREAS, Manhattan Community Board Six (CB6) has regularly received permits to conduct street fair activities;

WHEREAS, the business community of Community District Six has expressed concerns that street fairs did not include local businesses, and often hurt them economically when street fairs operated near their establishments;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Manhattan Community Board Six does not support the Moratorium on Street Fairs being extended through calendar year 2018;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that CB6 supports maintaining the current number of street fair events per year to ensure that the New York Police Department can effectively deploy police resources;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that CB6 has received community feedback on the unvarying nature of street fairs and the large economic hold of a few promoters on the Street Fairs business. And, to promote competition, inclusion of local businesses, and to foster greater diversity of street fair events, CB6 disapproves of the moratorium actively preventing new applicants from applying for events;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that CB6 urges SAPO to amend their Moratorium on Street Fairs to allow new applicants to apply for events in calendar year 2018;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that CB6 strongly recommends that the City review their long-term policies regarding Street Fairs with an aim to increasing local business

involvement in such events. As such, the Board recommends promoters be required to set aside AT LEAST 25% of vendor booths at Street Fairs for local businesses and merchants. Furthermore, considering the large hold of very few promoters on the Street Fairs business, the Board recommends that the City review the financial breakdown of profits generated from the street fairs to ensure that they provide ample benefits to the Community Groups that sponsor them.

Resolution Opposing the Request for a New Inter-city Bus Stop at 340 Lexington Ave (West Side) between E. 40th and E. 39th Streets by Hampton Jitney, Inc.

WHEREAS, the applicant has petitioned the New York City Department of Transportation (“DOT”) for consent to utilize an existing MTA bus and Intercity bus stop at 340 Lexington Ave.;

WHEREAS, the applicant has received DOT approval for the proposed use of this stop as a pick-up location for eight scheduled trips per day;

WHEREAS, the committee voiced concerns that this stop is used by NYC MTA vehicles and the pickup of passengers would delay these bus routes;

WHEREAS, the committee voiced concerns that this would further contribute to the already significant congestion in this area of Lexington Ave;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Community Board Six objects to the DOT granting approval for this application.

Resolution Supporting a Department of Transportation Proposal to Open E. 43rd St. Between Lexington and 3rd Avenues to Both Cars and Pedestrians

WHEREAS, the East Midtown Rezoning plan is expected to enlarge that area's population and demands on the public realm;

WHEREAS, New York City Department of Transportation (NYC DOT) studies show that pedestrians currently outnumber motor vehicles there 16 to 1;

WHEREAS, NYC DOT proposes studying the possibility of a "shared street" on E. 43rd Street between Lexington and 3rd Avenues to expand usable pedestrian space;

WHEREAS, a "shared street" is designed for slow travel speeds where motor vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians all share the right of way and use the full street area, since sidewalks are eliminated to create a single level from building line to building line;

WHEREAS, NYC DOT has a variety of possible tools to avert potential user conflicts on "shared streets," drawing on models in other cities and examples in NYC, such as on Broadway between W. 24th and W. 25th Streets;

WHEREAS, those tools include:

- prominent yellow signage demarcating the "shared street" and indicating the "suggested" 5 mph speed limit for motor vehicles within the area
- various types of street surfaces and markings to separate and safeguard different classes of users;

WHEREAS, NYC DOT will convene a community meeting this winter to gather public input and feedback that will inform their planning for proposed changes to E. 43rd Street;

WHEREAS, after assessing the meeting's results, NYC DOT will create design options that will be presented by spring 2018 to the Transportation Committee of Manhattan Community Board Six (CB6);

WHEREAS, CB6 must review NYC DOT's design before any physical changes to E. 43rd Street are implemented;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Community Board Six supports NYC DOT's proposal to study and plan for the possibility of remaking E. 43rd Street into a "shared street."
