What is the ULURP process?

The Uniform Land Use Review Process (ULURP) <u>www1.nyc.gov/site/planning/applicants/applicant-portal/step5-ulurp-process.page</u> is the standardized public review timeline for certain zoning actions as mandated by the NYC Charter.

What is the status of a land use application in my Community Board?

• Zoning Application Portal (ZAP) <u>www.zap.planning.nyc.gov/projects</u> allows the public to find current and historic information about Land Use applications.

What is the CEQR environmental review process?

 The City Environmental Quality Review (CEQR) process is a parallel review of land use applications to identify and discuss the possible effects of the proposed zoning actions on the environment. www1.nyc.gov/site/planning/applicants/environmental-review-process.page

How do I file a land use application?

Applicant Portal <u>www1.nyc.gov/site/planning/applicants/applicant-portal/application-process.page</u> provides
information on what is required to prepare land use and environmental review applications and information on the
Department's pre-Certification Process and the formal public review process (ULURP).

Is a proposed building site located on a mapped public street or a private road?

NYC Street Map <u>streets.planning.nyc.gov</u> allows the public to more easily delve into development potential and
restrictions related to the streets on which they live and see how the street grid has changed over time.

How does Zoning work?

- The 2018 <u>Zoning Handbook</u> provides easy-to-understand descriptions of zoning rules that guide the physical development of the city.
- If you want to dig deeper, the digital version of the <u>NYC Zoning Resolution</u>, <u>Zoning Maps</u>, and <u>Zoning Toolkit</u> are all available online.

How do I find my zoning district?

 <u>ZOLA</u>: online mapping tool that allows you search for property specific information by address or location, building/block/lot, intersection, or place of interest. Use this tool to access up-to-date zoning and land use information. <u>zola.planning.nyc.gov</u>

How do I get answers to Zoning questions?

Population FactFinder: <u>popfactfinder.planning.nyc.gov</u> This interactive map allows you to easily create your own maps and reports using US population data to examine detailed and critical demographic, social, economic, and housing statistics, and how these statistics have changed over time.

NYC Facilities Explorer: <u>capitalplanning.nyc.qov</u> This interactive map that allows you to create your own maps and view all facilities and program sites that are owned, operated, funded, licensed or certified by a City, State, or Federal agency. It allows CBs and city agencies to track ongoing and planned capital projects and identify opportunities for coordination.

Metro Region Explorer: <u>metroexplorer.planning.nyc.gov</u> This is an interactive map that allows you to explore how your CB's population, housing and employment trends compare with data from the 3 counties and almost 900 municipalities that make up the tri-state NYC Metropolitan Region. Read the <u>Geography of Jobs</u> report online, this is an economic snapshot that informs discussions with Planning Directors across the region.

Flood Hazard Mapper: <u>nyc.gov/floodhazardmapper</u> provides a comprehensive overview of the City's coastal flood hazards and how they are likely to increase in the future.
